## MALE VOTERS WILL OUTNUMBER WOMEN

WASHINGTON, Apr. 7.—Ballot cast by women in the coming presidential election will fall short of the potential men's vote by over 2,500,000, provided the suffrage amendment is ratified and state registration laws enacted in time to permit women all over the country to participate, according to estimates by the National Woman's party.

With the 1910 census as a basis, the Woman's party estimates the number of men eligible to vote at 29,577,690, and the possible woman voters at 26,883,566. In 1916, however, the actual vote cast for all various presidential candidates was 18,528,743, omitting ballots thrown out for cause, which leaves over 11,000,000 possible votes unregistered. If as large a proportion of the men voters remain indifferent in the coming election, women political leaders here say that the eagerness of women to exercise their newly acquired privilege may more than offset the disparity in numbers between the sexes.

In five of the states, moreover, women of voting age outnumber the men. Massachusetts has the greatest preponderance of women "voters" with 58,264 more women than men, North Carolina is next with a women's majority of 15,288 and South Carolina with 10,307 is third. In Rhode Island women of voting age outnumber the men by 3,196 and in Maryland by 292.

## GOLD, OIL, ATTRACT MANY TO MONTANA

HELENA, Mont., Apr. 7.—Two oil fields and a new gold field are drawing the adventurous from far and near to Montana.

The standing oil field is little less a discovery than the new Winnett-Mosby field, more recent of discovery.

The gold rush is to the Scooby country, where ore assaying as high as \$120 to the ton in digging a well, according to reports. More than a hundred claims were staked within a few hours after the announcement of its discovery.

Oil seekers who have invaded state land projects, Governor Stewart has announced, must vacate or he will take steps to force them out. Clashes between ranchers and oil men have been reported.

## WHY SHOULDN'T THE FARMERS ADVERTISE?

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Apr. 7.—Modern business men advertise because it brings good returns, so why should not farmers advertise since farming is a business? Many farmers do not advertise as a means of gathering a few extra dollars from odds and ends being about the farm, according to C. J. McIntosh, assistant professor of industrial journalism at the Oregon Agricultural college.

"Farmers are advertising their surplus produce, high producing purebred plant and animal products and outgrown farm equipment in their community newspaper," says Professor McIntosh.

## MANY PRESCRIPTIONS

VANCOUVER, B. C., Apr. 7.—Three hundred and fifteen thousand ten prescriptions were issued last year by British Columbia physicians, according to the annual report of the prohibition commissioner. During year, in all British Columbia, 25,000 gallons of rye were prescribed, and only 9,051 of scotch. Total sales amounted to \$1,679,000. Amendments to the British Columbia act limit liquor prescriptions hereafter to eight ounces, instead of two quarts as heretofore.

## AIRPLANE DELIVERY

VANCOUVER, B. C., Apr. 7.—Early this summer hydroplanes will provide the Stewart mining camp all the comforts of a rural mail delivery and will deliver from the southern markets everything from prunes to a baby. Several machines are now being assembled in Seattle and will be ready about the first one will fly to Stewart.

With the final adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, 26,883,566 women became eligible to vote in all elections. Seventeen million were already entitled to vote for President under state laws, and 7,000,000 were entitled to vote for members of congress under state laws.

When a young woman was stopped recently from smoking in the restaurant of the United States Senate in Washington she took her case to the highest authorities, in this case the senators themselves, with the result that in future a woman will be permitted to enjoy her cigarette in the Senate restaurant if she so desires.

### CONSERVING GAS IN TEXAS FIELDS

AUSTIN, Texas, Apr. 7.—The waste of natural gas in Texas, which at one time amounted to 300,000 cubic feet, or the fuel equivalent of 26,000 tons of coal, per day, has been reduced until there is no considerable waste, according to a statement from the oil and gas division of the Texas railroad commission.

The statement said in part: "The railroad commission gives credit for this happy condition largely to the operators, who have shown such a splendid spirit of co-operation, especially so when there is so little market for gas as at present, and where, in many cases, if the wells were allowed to blow, they might come in as good oil producers."
