HAWAIIAN HAS GRAND FUNERAL

HONOLULU, T. H., Mar. 24. (By Mail).—Mayor Joseph F. Kern of Honolulu, Keo Kimo Pana to his own people, the Hawaiians, who died a little more than a week ago, was the first commoner in the history of Hawaii to be accorded royal honors at his funeral, which was held with gorgeous display that recalled the old island monarchy.

For two days the body of the late mayor, known as "Uncle Joe" and "the man of the people," lay in state in the former throne room of the old palace, now the senate chamber of the federal building, with the portraits of the kings and queens of Hawaii looking down on his bier from the walls, and the Daughters and Sons of Hawaiian Warriors, clad in their striking regalia, keeping the silent death watch.

Thousands of residents of Honolulu, rich and poor, of all the many nationalities found here, filed hour after hour past the bier to look for the last time on the face of the peniless mule driver from the hills of Kohala, island of Hawaii, who sat as mayor of Honolulu for five terms out of the six, since the city and county government was established in 1907.

Sunday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, the casket was borne down the broad steps of the old palace and placed on the catafalque. Right Rev. Albert H. Boynes, bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese of Zeugma, followed by his clergy, leading the way. The catafalque was drawn by 300 "poos" or stevedores, to whose union Mayor Kern belonged when he first came to Honolulu.

Outstanding from the long funeral procession, were the Daughters and Sons of Hawaiian Warriors, wearing their flowing "ahukulas" or cloaks of green, red and yellow, replicas of the priceless feather capes of bygone days. At their head moved three giant "kahills" or plumes on tall shafts, one black, two white and immediately behind these, three crossed spears, denoting that the departed had come from the ranks of a fighting clan of the monarchical days.

The route of the cortege from the old palace to the Roman Catholic cemetery was lined with thousands, while other throngs crowded the ancient burying ground as Mayor Kern's body was lowered to its last resting place.

John H. Wilson, former city engineer, in whose blood also runs the blood of Hawaiian warriors, has been selected by the supervisors to succeed to the mayoralty.

CUT WESTERN AIR PATROL TO SQUADRON

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9.—After withdrawing its objection to the Arnold project for an air patrol of all the forests of the Pacific coast and northwest states, the general staff of the army appears to have changed its attitude once more.

The excuse for the reversal of its position was that the air service is short almost 200 officers in its enlisted personnel. For this reason it was said that there must be a vast curtailment of the Arnold project, which called for six squadrons of 18 planes, each squadron manned by 192 officers and 792 enlisted men.

The general staff has accordingly issued an order providing for only one squadron of 21 planes, or enough to patrol only the forests of California and Oregon, with the main base at Mather field, Sacramento.

The war department contended that it is impossible to enlist the needed officers to make a complete air patrol possible because of a regulation which bars the reinstatement of discharged officers, except in case of an emergency.

NEVER SAW BRIDE

SANTA MONICA, Cal., Apr. 9.—Captain J. A. D. Cochran-Barnett, English veteran of the great war, and Miss Joan M. Layton, daughter of Major A. N. Layton of Old Park, Chichester, England, were married here recently. Captain Barnett has never seen his bride; he is blind, having given his vision on the western front.

Capt. Barnett met Miss Layton at a function in England, after he had been invalided home. After the wedding the bride and groom left by automobile for a leisurely tour of Canada, where the groom, despite his physical handicap, successfully manages his own wheat ranch.

HITS OIL WELL

HARLINGTON, Mont., Apr. 9.—Water from a well on the ranch of William Tabor, near here, began to taste, when it got down 135 feet. Tabor had the water analyzed and, it is reported, found he had run into high-grade oil. The well is in a new Montana oil field.

WELL ON RAMPAGE

MILLS CITY, Mont., Apr. 9.—Residents of this city are astonished over the unseemly behavior of an old artesian well, a landmark in the heart of the business district, which after a 10-year period of inactivity, recently came to life by producing steam.

Explanations for this erratic behavior of a once reliable cold water source are numerous but unsatisfactory. At any rate, the water is boiling within a foot of the top of the pipe, and it is believed that the well has turned into a geyser and hot spring.

USE WASTE OIL

LIVINGSTON, Mont., Apr. 9.—Waste oil from the garages of this city is to be put to work around the town, according to plans of Dr. S. E. Leard, local health officer. The waste oil, gathered in utensils placed in the garages, will be distributed in sections of the city where pools of stagnant water exist and in other places where it is suspected mosquitoes are bred. The oil also will be used in fighting flies during the summer and in burning the dead bodies of horses and other animals where such is necessary.

INVENTOR OF BARBED WIRE FENCES IS DEAD

HAYWARD, Calif., Apr. 8.—John Calvin Merrill, 84, credited with the invention of barbed wire when he was farming near Dubuque, Iowa, 52 years ago, died here recently.

WILL VISIT ROME

MELBOURNE, Australia, Mar. 13. (By Mail).—It is authoritatively stated here that Archbishop Daniel Mannix will sail for Rome on May 19 to visit the pope, who will make him a cardinal. He will then be given an important appointment in Ireland.

LIVINGSTON, Mont., Apr. 9.—Elk from the overcrowded preserves in this section are to be sent to other havens. Western Montana will receive some into the Ravalli country. Lewis and Clark county will place some in Dry Gulch, near Helena. Canada will take some and others are to go to the state of New York, it is announced here.

STATE FIELD MEET

MOSCOW, Idaho, Apr. 9.—High schools of the state of Idaho will participate in the state track and field meet to be held here under the auspices of the University of Idaho, May 13 and 14, it is announced here. Teams will be selected by elimination in local meets for each district, the winning team coming to Moscow to compete in the state championship meet.

The meet will be in charge of W. C. Bleamaster, physical director of the university.

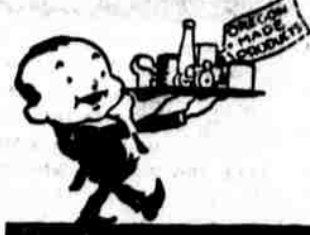
It is estimated that the total British capital invested in Mexico amounts to about \$500,000,000.
