TAX COLLECTIONS FOR FIRST INSTALLMENT HEAVY

Tax collections this year exceed last year's collections by \$100,000, according to the tax collector's office. About 70 per cent of the total 1919 tax of \$736,072.77 had been collected when the period of payment for the first installment ended April 5. Collections from irrigation districts were approximately \$170,000. Total property assessment this year is above \$17,000,000, and personal property more than \$2,500,000.
