S. Mills, J. W. Stephens, A. J. Simmers, N. F. Johnson and R. A. Eumitt, the owners of a certain body of land hereinafter described, adjacent to the boundaries of the Enterprise Irrigation District, said petition being in writing and acknowledged by the respective parties and in due form as made and required by law, and praying that the following described lands be included within the boundaries of the Enterprise Irrigation District, and made a part of said district:

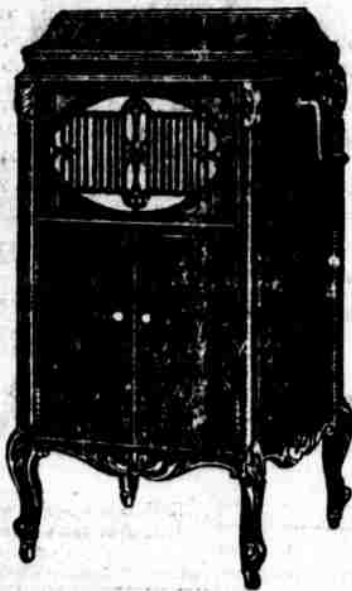
