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PREPARED FOR CONVENTION

CHICAGO, April 13.—Delegates at the republican national convention, opening here June 8, will be able to confer with representatives of other states without leaving their seats.

To eliminate a large part of the confusion incident to conferences between delegates on the floor, C. R. Hall, superintendent of the Coliseum, has arranged for the installation of telephones connecting all state, district and territorial delegations.

It is said that this will be the first time that such a system has been installed at any national convention.

There will be 53 telephones in service, reaching the 48 state groups and the representatives of the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and Porto Rico.

The convention architects have completed plans for the Coliseum, including an extra balcony that adds approximately 1,100 to the seating capacity. Work on the balcony and the convention offices, in the Coliseum annex, will start May 3. The Chicago convention committee is spending \$47,000 on changes to the building to accommodate the delegates and more than 10,000 spectators.

prohibition of child labor is, at best, only a negative attack upon the problem. It is not thoroughly effective in promoting the economic welfare of the nation unless the time spent by the child in industry is devoted to adequate schooling and to activity which will develop his physical well-being." The report announces the "startling fact" that of the 5,516,163 illiterate persons over ten years of age in the United States, more than 68 per cent were native born. Attention is called to the fact that the federal government up to the present "makes no provision which assures the non-employment of children in street trades and various blind alley occupations during the time they should be at school."

Permanent Reform

The Conference states that, in presenting its recommendations "they are not merely designed to tide over a troublesome period of the evils pointed out." It says, "were in existence before the war and will remain in existence if steps are not taken to remedy them." In conclusion, the report says, the reforms advocated are urged "not with any feeling of panic but with the belief that they will not only contribute largely toward the elimination of the causes of industrial strife, but that they will make for the introduction in American industry, of those democratic principles which constitute the most precious heritage of the American citizen."

The report is signed by Secretary of Labor Wilson as chairman; Herbert Hoover, as vice-chairman and the following other members of the

MILLS OPERATING AT FULL CAPACITY

Lumber mills in the northwest are operating practically at capacity to keep up with the persistent demand for lumber that is coming from all parts of the country, according to the weekly report of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. At 126 mills in western Oregon and western Washington reporting to the association production for the week ending April 3 was 91,476,124 feet, the report says. This volume was only 976,876 feet, or 1.06 per cent, below normal for the week. The report continues:

"Inadequate car supply keeps shipments substantially below production and prevents the mills accepting some of the business offered them. Total shipments for the week were 74,605,076 feet, of which 58,020,000 feet moved by rail, 7,299,266 feet went to California by water, 4,637,863 feet was exported and 4,648,847 feet was delivered locally.

"New business accepted by this group of mills was 80,046,384 feet, or 5,440,408 feet more than they shipped.

"The mills contributing to this report still have 10,822 cars, or 324,680,000 feet, of unfilled rail orders on their books, besides 61,735,647 feet of domestic cargo orders and 52,504,905 feet of export orders—an aggregate of 438,900,552 feet.

"Latest calculations show that stocks at the mills are somewhat below normal."
