BOLSHEVIKI WORKING
AGAINST AMERICA

THE HAGUE, Mar. 16. (By Mail).
The Bolsheviki are conducting a
strong campaign against America,
England and France by the skillful
use of huge propaganda posters in
Moscow, says G. Nijpels, correspondent
of the Amsterdam Handelsblad,
who visited Soviet Russia this winter.

"This poster campaign is certainly
a very clever piece of work," he
writes. "Both the educated and un-
lettered classes are struck by them,
the first by the writing beneath, the
second by the drawings themselves.
The campaign was directed along
three great lines: First, to cultivate
hatred, loathing and fear for such
men as Kolchak and Denikine; second,
to breed hatred of the Entente,
especially against the 'capitalistic
criminate,' France, England and
America—never Japan, Italy, the
Poles or Czecho-Slovaks—but always
this triumvirate, pictured as the
bourgeoisie parasiting upon the pro-
letariat; and, third, to prevent de-
sertion among the red soldiers.

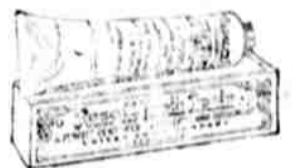

SIMPLIFY OLD
WRITING SYSTEM

SHANGHAI, March 12. (By Mail.)

Chinese of future generations will
write in phonetic script and use a
typewriter with only 39 characters
instead of plying a brush to draw
10,000 or more hieroglyphics if mis-
sion workers succeed in an effort

they are making to revolutionize
handwriting in use in China for more
than 4,000 years. The work of the
missionaries is at last beginning to
receive official sanction and they en-
tertain hopes that eventually the
Chinese brush, ink block and ink
tablet will have to give place to
more modern methods of com-
municating ideas.

Their purpose is not only to sim-
plify China's handwriting system but
to give the country a common tongue
to replace the present-day babel
which renders even the native who is

away from his own home district at-
most as helpless as a foreigner.

The system of phonetic script now
urged upon the Chinese was worked
out in England in 1903 by Wang
Chao. Besides its 39 characters, it
contains 10 numerals. There are no
capitals.

Rev. E. G. Tewksbury, of Shang-
hai, secretary of the China Sunday
School Union, and a member of the
Phonetic Promotion committee, who
has devoted 30 years to teaching in
China, has put the new script into
use on American typewriters with

complete success. For this purpose
typewriters with blank type faces
are obtained from the factories and
the characters are cut from these
faces here by Chinese engravers.

That the Peking government at-
taches importance to the effort
being made is seen in the following
excerpt from a great mandate issued
by the Ministry of Education.

"We recognize that because of the
difference between our classical and
spoken language, education in the
schools makes slow progress and the
keen edge of the spirit of union, both

between individuals and in society
at large, has thereby been blunted.
Moreover, if we do not take prompt
steps to make the written and spoken
language the same quickly, any
plans for developing our civilization
will surely fall."
