

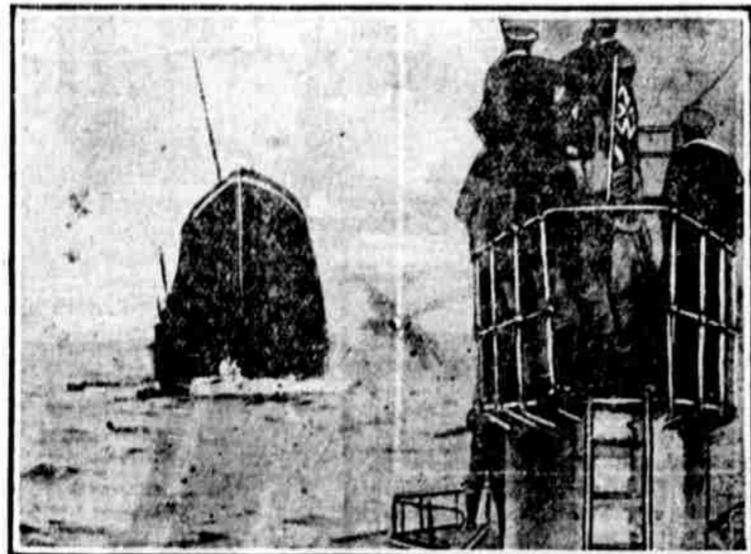

## CONFERENCE ON CHURCH UNITY

DES MOINES, Iowa, Apr. 12.—Proposals for a reunion of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South will be considered at the quadrennial conference of the former body to be held here beginning May 1. Hundreds of delegates from all parts of the United States and many from foreign countries, will attend this gathering of the supreme law-making body of the Methodist Episcopal Church which includes not only the legislative but judicial and administrative branches of the church government.

Commissions from the conferences of this organization as well as the Methodist Episcopal Church South, have approved plans for the reunion of these two great Methodist organizations and discussion of this project is expected to be one of the chief questions to be decided.

It is expected that, as usual, some of the delegates will ask the church body to liberalize its attitude toward dancing and other amusements.

Pronouncements will be made on education, temperance, capital and labor, morals, marriage and divorce, child labor, evangelism, immigration, evangelization and Christianization of the foreign element, worldwide missionary operations and kindred subjects.

Selection of new bishops will be one of the most important purposes of the meeting. Their number will be determined by the Committee on Episcopacy. Usually from six to ten new bishops are named. Being the highest office in the church, the position is much sought for. In addition editors of the various church publications and other offices will be elected. Delegates will include both ministers and laymen and women will be admitted as lay delegates.
