## SOLDIER WOULD BE STATE SECRETARY

SALEM, Ore., April 14.—M. Vernon Parsons of Lane county, the only soldier candidate, today filed his declaration for the Republican nomination for Secretary of State. Parsons volunteered to the first officers' training camp, failed to receive a commission, returned home, underwent a surgical operation in order to fit himself for service, then enlisted in the Marines, was later commissioned in the ranks, and fought throughout the war with the Marines in the Second Division, was cited by General Pershing for gallantry in action and brilliant leadership, returning home a First Lieutenant. He asks to have printed after his name on the ballot the following 12 words: "Republican schools; develop Oregon; reduce taxes; business administration." His one hundred word platform filed with his declaration is as follows: "If nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, instill the same energy and efficiency into the employees under my charge that characterized my division (Second Division) in battle, reduce expenditures by cutting out 'red tape' and not using state postage stamps, stationery and stenographers to advertise my name, and as representative of the people on the many important State Boards give a square deal to all, keep down taxes without being penny wise and pound foolish, encourage development, better marketing facilities for products and better schools. The office requires a business executive, accountants and bookkeepers will be hired; this means a business administration by a business man."

At a banquet held by 30 members of the Lane County Bar association, Mr. Parsons was given a cordial endorsement.

Mr. Parsons is pleased with the approval given him by his brother attorneys, as there was no politics in it, all voting to endorse his candidacy. The resolutions are as follows:

"Whereas, Mr. Vernon Parsons, a member of this association, is a candidate for the office of secretary of state; and

"Whereas, Mr. Parsons has lived among us for many years, and has shown himself to be a well-read lawyer, a good citizen, and an excellent soldier during the world war;

"Therefore, be it resolved by the Lane County Bar association, that we hereby express our unqualified approval of Mr. Parsons as an earnest, patriotic citizen; an able lawyer; an excellent soldier whose record during the recent war was one of the best; and as one well fitted for participation in state affairs."

Alex McCarthy, second baseman of the Kansas City American association team, has been appointed to succeed John Ganzel as manager of the Blues.
