RUSSIA TIRED OF IDLENESS

LONDON, Mar. 24. (By Mail).—The Russian Soviet government has threatened to put the workshops of the northern railways under martial law to put an end to what it calls the "crime" of the workers in wasting time in holiday-making, according to a wireless message from Moscow. The government asserts that 1,000 working days were thus lost in one month and that "the railway men are arranging to have two days of idleness each week at a time when millions of people are hungering and when it is impossible to transport bread, owing to lack of railway engines." It notifies the idlers that they will either have to make up for the time "of which the republic has been robbed" or receive full penalty under martial law.

The message issued by the government is headed "Shame comrades," and declares that Russia cannot await salvation from foreigners but must fight her own internal blockade in order to "end the ruinous condition of things, conquer hunger and save the Soviet Republic."

PLEA FOR UNLIMITED BOOZE IS DENIED

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa, March 23. (By Mail).—Plea of the white residents of the Cook Islands that limitations on the importation of alcoholic liquors be removed was denied by Sir James Allen, head of the New Zealand parliamentary party which is touring the South Seas. It was reported on arrival of the party here this month.

The demand of the whites for representation on the legislative council of the Islands was granted. At Apia in Western Samoa both white settlers and natives set forth objections to New Zealand acting with mandatory authority from the league of nations. It was reported. Direct control from London was preferred, it was said.

MARRIAGE DAY SET BY SULTAN

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 18. (By Mail).—The Sultan, Mohammed VI, has issued an Imperial decree proclaiming May 1 as "marriage day" throughout Turkey in an effort to promote the weddings and to arrest the decline in the birthrate. This action was taken on the request of Hazine Bey, Minister of Interior, who ascribes the decreased number of births in Turkey to the frivolity of young women.

In the Sultan's decree, all engaged persons who have been unable to marry earlier are urged to do so on May 1. As an inducement no charges are to be made for marriages performed on that day, guests at weddings are to make no gifts, the first children of those who wed on May 1 are to receive the names of the children of the Sultan and to receive the gift of a bracelet from the governor of the province in which the child is born.

The Sultan's son is named d'Ertogroul and his daughters are Roukie and d'Ulvie.

The edict is especially directed to the province of Broussa, in Anatolia, which attracted much unfavorable comment in the Mohammedan press because of its greatly reduced birth-rate and the tendency of its population to violate the Moslem prohibition of the use of intoxicating beverages. That people of Anatolian villages, men and women alike, indulge what they call "burning nights" of music and feasting.

Indulgence in modern dancing has aroused the protest of a member of the Chamber of Deputies from Anatolia who has introduced a bill authorizing officials to prevent women from "participating in the antics and capers of the ball room."
