### NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE GROUND SQUIRRELS

(Reprint of Original Notice Which Was Duly Published in April, 1919.)

BY ORDER OF THE COUNTY COURT OF KLAMATH COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON, in pursuance of State Statute, relative to extermination and eradication of GROUND SQUIRRELS, OTHER NOXIOUS RODENTS AND PREDATORY ANIMALS; Every person, firm, co-partnership, company or corporation residing on, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge or dominion over any land, building, wharf, or dock infested with Oregon Ground Squirrels in Klamath County, Oregon, is hereby notified to begin at once to effectively exterminate and destroy all such Ground Squirrels.

The following poison for mixing and instructions for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of such Ground Squirrels and is hereby recommended, to-wit: alkaloid strychnine used on oats, mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Oats, clean, good, heavy oats, 20 quarts; Strychnine, (powdered alkaloid), 1 ounce; Bicarbonate of Soda, (baking soda), 1 ounce; Thin Starch Paste, 1/2 pint; Heavy Corn Syrup, 1/2 pint; Glycerine, 1 ounce; Saccharine, 1/2 ounce; Salt, 4 tablespoonful.

This material should be mixed as follows: Mix dry, one ounce powdered strychnine and one ounce of baking soda. Make a starch paste of: Stir one tablespoonful of gloss starch into one-half cup of cold water, then pour it into one-half pint of boiling water and cook until a thick, clear, transparent paste is formed which is free from lumps. When paste is formed, add the dry mixture of strychnine and soda. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Add one-half pint of heavy corn syrup (Karo is best). Stir in four tablespoonful of salt. Add one ounce of glycerine (mix well). Add, while stirring, one teaspoonful (or one-eighth ounce) of saccharine. Pour this over twenty quarts of good, clean, heavy oats and mix until each kernel is coated. For convenience in handling, the grain should now be spread out to dry, stirring it up occasionally to prevent drying in a cake.

One quart of the poisoned grain mixed as aforesaid is sufficient for forty to sixty baits and this quantity scattered along squirrel trails or on clean hard places on the surface about the holes will not endanger stock. Strychnine in any form other than the powdered strychnine alkaloid is not effective in the above formula.

From the date hereof until May 15 is the most effective time to poison and destroy the Ground Squirrels.

The County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, has secured a supply of strychnine and the other ingredients necessary for the mixture, and a quantity thereof has been mixed and is now on sale to the farmers or persons interested at actual cost and may be had by applying to the undersigned at his office in the Loomis Building, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

If any person herein designated shall within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin in good faith to exterminate, eradicate and destroy, according to the method aforesaid, or by any other effective means, said Ground Squirrels herein designated, the County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such Ground Squirrels, and the cost thereof incurred will be assessed to such land, building, wharf, or dock and unless paid will become a lien against the same, for the extermination of said Ground Squirrels.

This notice is published pursuant to the Statute in such case made and provided for and for two consecutive weeks or three issues, and all persons described therein are required to take notice thereof.

### LONDON UNVEILS CAVELL MONUMENT

LONDON, March 30. (By Mail.)—A monument to Edith Cavell, the British nurse who was shot by the Germans at Brussels, has been erected in the Charing Cross Road, just off Trafalgar Square and almost under the shadow of the Nelson Monument.

The unveiling ceremony was conducted before a huge crowd by the Queen Mother, Alexandra, being the first act of state she has performed in London since the death of her husband King Edward VII.

The monument is of grey granite and stands 40 feet high. On the four panels are the words: Humanity, Sacrifice, Devotion and Fortitude. On the back is the British lion trampling on a serpent, and above it are the words: "Faithful unto Death."

The statue, of white marble, shows Nurse Cavell standing erect in her nurse's uniform. On the base is the inscription: "Edith Cavell Brussels Dawn, October 12, 1915."

### MARKERS FOR FIELD OF GETTYSBURG

GETTYSBURG, Pa., April 16.—Monuments to mark the various headquarters or the nine corps commanders of the Union army in the battle of Gettysburg are to be erected within the next few weeks under the direction of the National Park Commission. The design is the creation of Colonel E. B. Cope, engineer of the commission. A granite base will be surmounted in each instance by a cannon.
