#### Farm Bureau Items

The stormy weather checked the putting out of squirrel poison. With warmer weather again, the activities along this line will be resumed. The county pest inspector, Grant Nelson, has been kept busy in various communities lining up the work with the farm bureau committeemen. Two tons more of the poisoned grain were mixed last week and another shipment of struchnine received this morning for mixing a further supply. A shortage of poisoned grain sacks has caused some delay in getting supplies to various centers for distribution. Those who have empty sacks will help this matter out, if they will return them to the office. Sacks returned in good condition of the sack

Another pool order of Grimm alfolfa seed was received last week. This makes a total of about 12,500 pounds of Grimm alfalfa seed brought into the county this year. This included the shipment brought in and distributed through the Merrill bank as well as that handled through the farm bureau.

The farm bureau office has been made a distributing point for the new black-leg vaccine, which is being used by a great many of the breeders now as it gives life immunity, one vaccination being all that is necessary. The office also is a distributing point for the government vaccine upon which there is no
