'WET' AND 'DRY' ISSUE NEBRASKA

LINCOLN, Neb., April 20.—The "wet" and "dry" issue has been brought to the fore in Nebraska's primary at which both republicans and democrats today will express their choice of presidential candidates.

Republicans entered for presidential indorsement are Generals John J. Pershing and Leonard Wood and United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson, of California.

The liquor question was brought out by the democratic contest for control of the state's delegation to the San Francisco convention.

Mr. Bryan, opponent of what he says are efforts to raise the legal limit of alcohol in beverages, is seeking a place on the delegation and has announced that if he is elected he will not support Senator Hitchcock because of his opposition to submission of the federal prohibition amendment and for other reasons.
