REGULATIONS FOR DIPPING MUST BE OBSERVED

Inspector H. E. Armstrong, of the United States bureau of animal industry, has received instructions from the district headquarters at Walla Walla, Washington, to the effect that the dipping of sheep in Klamath county this season will not be recognized unless it is done in exact accordance with bureau requirements and under the immediate supervision of a duly authorized inspector.

He is further informed that the number of inspectors available for assignment to dipping vats is very limited, and that these inspectors must be assigned to vats where their time will do the most good and their efforts serve the greatest number. Hence, it is desired that sheep owners of the different localities be urged to secure the building of modern dipping plants of sufficient capacity to allow of the handling of their sheep in a rapid, efficient, and economical manner.

Lime-sulphur dip and nicotine dip are now the only permitted dips for the treatment of sheep infected with or exposed to scab.

Operation of dipping vats having inadequate heating facilities, whereby the proper dipping temperature cannot be maintained, will not be permitted for the official dipping, after shearing, as satisfactory work is impossible under those conditions.

The use of the ready-prepared lime-sulphur dip for the spring dipping will be general.

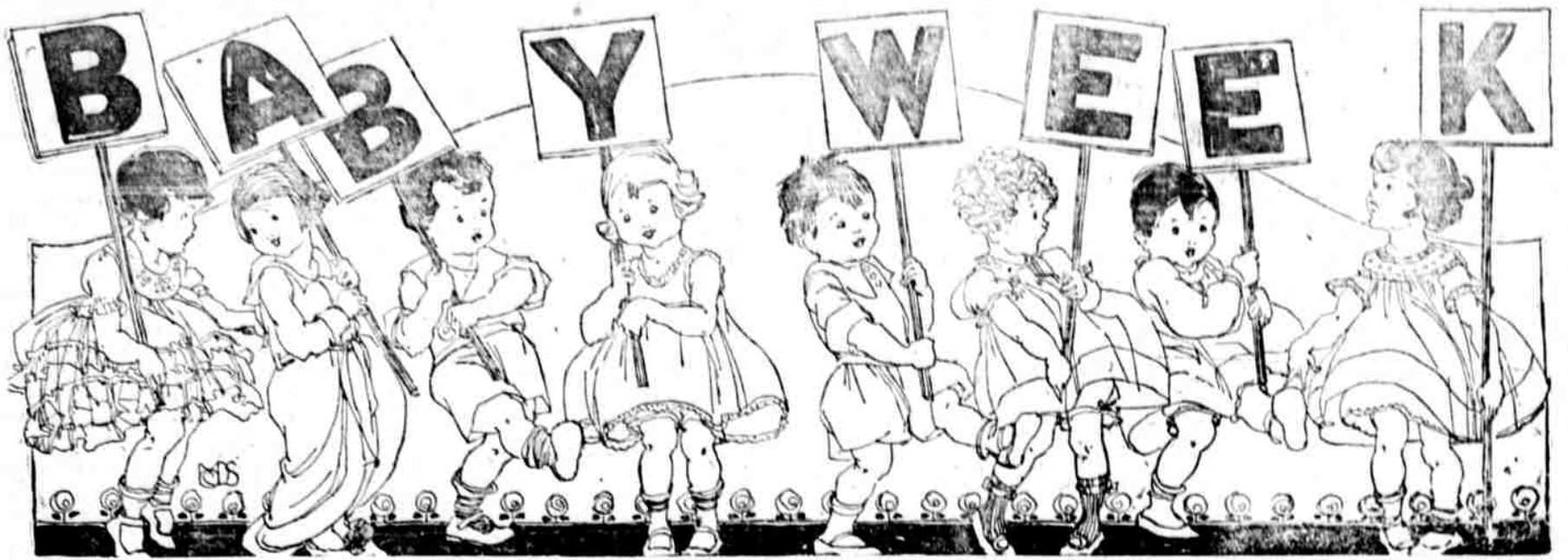
