PROGRESSING

The annual congregational meeting of the Presbyterian church held last week, was the best from standpoint of reports and outlook the church has ever had. There was a large number of members of church and congregation present. The ladies served a most appetizing supper at 6:30 p. m. At 7:45 p. m. the meeting was called to order and reports were heard from all organizations. The report from pastor and session showed a total gain in new members of 46 for the year. Losses from deaths, removals, etc., amounting to 21, making a net gain of 25. This added to the membership reported last year, 189, makes a membership to be reported this year on April 1 of 194. With a live and growing Sunday school which has increased one-third in membership from 149 to 192, well graded and organized, as a feeder for the church and many new people moving into the community together with multitudes who are not attending any church, gives large outlook for work and growth during the coming year. The benevolent treasurer reported \$728.95 collected from all sources for the church benevolences—the fund going to various church boards, Armenians, Y. M. C. A., etc. The Woman's Missionary society reported funds contributed to various agencies to the amount of \$82 which was away before their quota.

The Kedron club, an organization of young ladies, have contributed \$225 to the church building fund, pledged \$250 to the pipe organ fund, the most of which is already paid—in addition to funds used for flowers for sick and other beneficial lines of service.

The girls' class reported \$25 contributed to the building fund and the older boys' class \$70, other classes \$10.

Reports from the building fund were very gratifying showing but a

very small deficit to be made up to completely settle all outstanding bills which on building and lot and furnishings amount to \$234.19. The report on running expense accounts also showed excellent financial conditions at the close of the year. A budget of \$4,800 was adopted for the new year as against \$3,000 for last year. The local drive to raise this amount will be put on April 25 to May 2, called the New Era drive, which will be at the same as the Inter-church World drive for Inter-church World funds.

Words of hearty commendation were given by the gathering to the chairman and members of the building and finance committees for their faithful service during the building project.

Report from the pipe organ firm shows inadequate space for a pipe organ but the difficulties will probably be remedied, although the company has sold orders so far ahead that we do not see an organ before the first of next year from present outlook.

J. B. Mason and C. C. Hogue were unanimously made life members of the board of elders. George Grizzle was also added to the same board. E. W. Vannice, A. B. Epperson and E. S. Henry were new members added to the board of trustees. A. M. Collier has been chosen chairman of the board, as Arthur Wilson tendered his resignation of that position.

NOTICE INVITING PROPOSALS  
TO PURCHASE SEWER BONDS

Sealed bids will be received by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 10th day of May, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the City Hall in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, at which time and place proposals to purchase for the purchase of \$50,735.00 City of Klamath Falls General Obligation bonds, payable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Oregon Fiscal Agency in New York, state of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said City as determined by the purchaser and the Common Council. NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE  
GROUND SQUIRRELS

(Reprint of Original Notice Which Was Duly Published in April, 1919.)

BY ORDER OF THE COUNTY COURT OF KLAMATH COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON, in pursuance of State Statute, relative to extermination and eradication of GROUND SQUIRRELS, OTHER NOXIOUS RODENTS AND PREDATORY ANIMALS: Every person, firm, co-partnership, company or corporation residing on, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge or dominion over any land, building, wharf, or dock infested with Oregon Ground Squirrels in Klamath County, Oregon, is hereby notified to begin at once to effectively exterminate and destroy all such Ground Squirrels.

The following poison for mixing and instructions for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of such Ground Squirrels and is hereby recommended, to-wit: alkaloid strychnine used on oats, mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit: Oats, clean, good, heavy oats, 20 quarts; Strychnine, powdered, 20 grains; 1 ounce; Bicarbonate of Soda, (baking soda), 1 ounce; Thin Starch Paste, 1/2 pint; Heavy Corn Syrup, 1/2 pint; Glycerine, 1 ounce; Saccharine, 1/4 ounce; Salt, 4 tablespoonsful.

This material should be mixed as follows: Mix dry, one ounce powdered strychnine and one ounce of baking soda. Make a starch paste of: Stir one tablespoonful of glass starch into one-half cup of cold water, then pour it into one-half pint of boiling water and cook until a thick, clear, transparent paste is formed which is free from lumps. When paste is formed, add the dry mixture of strychnine and soda. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Add one-half pint of heavy corn syrup (Karo is best). Stir in four tablespoonful of salt. Add one ounce of glycerine (mix well). Add, while stirring, one teaspoonful (or one-eighth ounce) of saccharine. Pour this over twenty quarts of good, clean, heavy oats and mix until each kernel is coated. For convenience in handling, the grain should now be spread out to dry, stirring it up occasionally to prevent drying in a cake.

One quart of the poisoned grain mixed as aforesaid is sufficient for forty to sixty baits and this quantity scattered along squirrel trails or on clean hard places on the surface about the holes will not endanger stock. Strychnine in any form other than the powdered strychnine alkaloid is not effective in the above formula.

From the date hereof until May 15 is the most effective time to poison and destroy the Ground Squirrels.

The County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, has secured a supply of strychnine and the other ingredients necessary for the mixture, and a quantity thereof has been mixed and is now on sale to the farmers or persons interested at actual cost and may be had by applying to the undersigned at his office in the Loomis Building, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

If any person herein designated shall within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin in good faith to exterminate, eradicate and destroy, according to the method aforesaid, or by any other effective means, said Ground Squirrels herein designated, the County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such Ground Squirrels, and the cost thereof incurred will be assessed to such land, building, wharf, or dock and unless paid will become a lien against the same, for the extermination of said Ground Squirrels.

This notice is published pursuant to the Statute in such case made and provided and for two consecutive weeks or three issues, and all persons described therein are required to take notice thereof.
