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democrat; two representatives in congress and a governor to county officials.

Frank R. Gooding, former governor and opponent of the Non-Partisan League, will try again to defeat Senator Nugent, having failed in the attempt two years ago. His opponents in the fight for the nomination by republicans will include Col. L. V. Patch and Captain A. H. Conner, both overseas veterans.

Idaho parties will nominate state candidates at conventions in August at Idaho Falls.

The republicans meet at Couer d'Alene April 28 to select delegates to their national convention and the democrats will take similar action at Lewiston June 15.

**Montana**

The state presidential preferential primary election in Montana is set for April 23. Petitions have been filed in behalf of five candidates for the republican nomination. No democratic presidential candidates have entered the race.

Governor Sam V. Stewart's name has been entered and Warren G. Harding, Ohio; Herbert C. Hoover, California; Hiram W. Johnson, California; Leonard Wood, New York, and Frank O. Lowden, Illinois.

The state primaries, at which state and county officers will be nominated, will be held August 24.

**Oregon**

Oregon's state presidential primary election will be held Friday, May 21. Each of the two principal political parties will elect ten delegates to the national conventions, four each from the state at large, and six each from the congressional districts of the state, two per party from each of the three such districts.

Oregon voters will indicate their preference for the nomination for the office of president and vice-president of the United States by a direct preferential vote for these candidates. All candidates for president and vice-president will have their names on the ballot, and those finally elected national convention delegates will

be expected to vote for those candidates from each party for whom the voters have expressed a preference.

Each party will vote for the nomination of five presidential electors; a candidate for the nomination for United States senator; three candidates for the nomination for members of the House of Representatives and candidates for state and county offices.

**Nevada**

The republican state convention, which will choose six delegates and six alternates to the Chicago convention will meet in Reno on April 27.

The Nevada convention in addition to selecting delegates to the Chicago convention, will make a recommendation for appointment as national committeemen from Nevada.

Primary elections were held in each county to select state convention delegates and no effort was made to send an instructed delegation from any county. Only two presidential candidates have made any campaign in Nevada, Gen. Leonard Wood and Gov. Frank O. Lowden. Supporters of these candidates will fight for an instructed delegation, it is said.

Only one candidate has made an active campaign for appointment as national committeeman, Sam Platt of Reno.

Delegates to the democratic convention were chosen several weeks ago by the state central committee of the party. They are uninstructed.

**New Mexico**

In addition to a justice of the supreme court and a representative in the lower house of congress, New Mexico will elect a full set of state and county officers this year.

New Mexico has no primary law and nominations for state and, in most cases, county offices are made in convention. Primaries are held in a few counties, but this is purely a local arrangement and there is no law to govern it.

The republican state convention March 26 elected delegates to the national convention. The democrats will hold their state convention at Roswell on June 3 to select delegates to the national convention at San Francisco in July.

**Washington and Alaska**

Full tickets, carrying names of candidates for posts ranging from one governorship, a United States senatorship, and seats in congress to county offices, will be submitted to Washington electors at a state primary election September 14. The candidates chosen at the primaries will run again at the general election November 2.

Alaska voters also will have many names to pick from at primary elections April 27 at which they will choose candidates for territorial offices. The Alaska candidates also will make the final run November 2.

The Republican state convention at Bellingham April 27 will select delegates to the national convention. The Democratic state convention will meet at Spokane May 17 for a similar purpose.

**Wyoming**

On May 10, Wyoming political parties will hold their state conventions. Delegates to the state conventions are to be chosen at county conven-

tions to be held May 4. For the state meeting the Republican will gather at Sheridan and the Democrats at Lander.

The regular primaries are not held until August 17 and the only matters to be settled at that time are the choices of the two parties for Wyoming's sole congressman and for county officials and members of the legislature. No amendments or other constitutional questions are up for consideration this year.

At a recent meeting of the Republican state central committee in Cheyenne National Committeeman Patrick Sullivan urged that an instructed delegation be sent to the national convention and no objection was offered by those present.

**Utah**

Preparations are being made by Utah Democrats for their state convention here April 23 for the selection of delegates to the national convention at San Francisco. The Republicans will select national con-

vention delegates at their state convention at Price, Utah, on May 3.

### ORGANIZATIONS SUPPORT BILL

PORTLAND, Apr. 23.—The "deadline" for closing the polls on the State Chamber of Commerce referendum on the four measures and the five constitutional amendments that will be on the ballot of May 21 has been extended by State Secretary George Quayle, a number of clubs being too late to get their ballots in by the original time of closing, April 15. Mr. Quayle's office expects to make the result known before May 1.

A ballot containing arguments for and against each measure and each amendment, was sent to the chambers, so that individual members might vote on them.

One of the measures that seems likely to fare exceedingly well is the one providing 1.26 mills for the further support of the State University, the Agricultural College and the State Normal School. While no referendum results have been given out on it, it has to date been officially endorsed by the commercial organizations of the following cities:

Salem, Dallas, Bend, Pendleton, Hillsboro, Grants Pass, Redmond, Portland East Side Marshfield, Enterprise, Cottage Grove, Ashland, The Dalles and North Bend.

The legislative committee of the Baker Chamber of Commerce, the Union County Ad Club, the Federated Community Clubs of Marion county and other business groups have also endorsed the measure, which has received about 100 formal endorsements so far.
