Samuel L. Clinton and son, Paul, are visitors today from Fort Klamath.

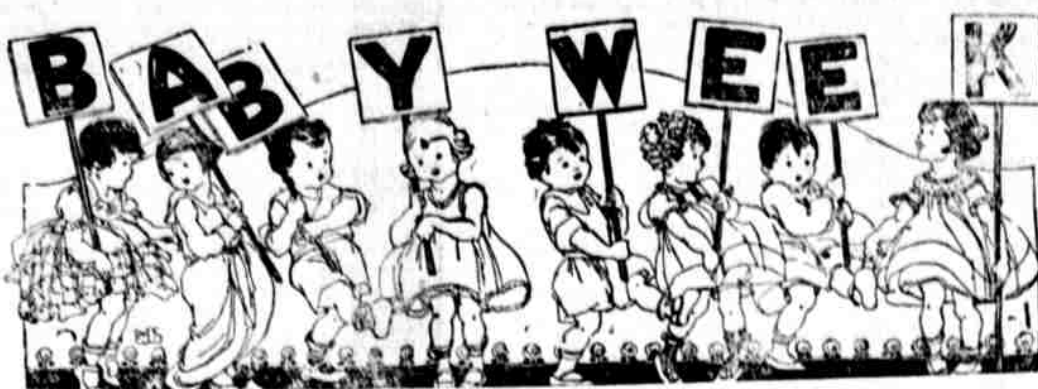
H. E. Hauger has purchased the residence of Mrs. K. Taylor at the corner of Pine and Juniper and will take possession on May 1st.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 23.—Rear Admiral Carlo B. Brittain, chief of staff of Admiral Henry B. Wilson, commander of the Atlantic fleet, committed suicide by shooting himself yesterday while the fleet was in Cuban waters, according to advices to the navy department.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Apr. 23.—Ignacio Pesqueira, chief justice of the Mexican supreme court, who is understood to have been appointed military governor of Sonora, was arrested by United States officers as he was leaving on a train here today. A woman, said to have been brought here by Pesqueira from Mexico, is detained.

NEW YORK, Apr. 23.—Indictments charging profiteering in meats

were returned by the federal grand jury at Brooklyn today against the Chicago packing houses of Swift, Armour and Wilson and their representatives here.

BIRMINGHAM, Apr. 23.—Reports received today from the portions of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee swept by Tuesday's tornadoes brought the death list to 233.

CALF WALKS INTO WIRE; ELECTROCUTED

A young steer owned by Wampler Bros. was electrocuted last night on the Keno road when it came in contact with a "live" wire on the California-Oregon Power company's system. This is the only casualty reported. The wire is said to have been a hot one that fused stones where it chanced to lay across them.

It was discovered by C. L. Lewis, who notified the power company and the wire was removed. During the process current was shut off the circuit and residents of the district were without lights during the evening.

The wire is said to have been a loose end left overnight by a construction crew, which is stringing a new line, that became crossed with one of the high power transmission wires and laid along side the road from the Rock Crusher hill to the Hague ranch.
