LINER FOLLOWS HISTORIC ROUTE

SIDNEY, March 16. (By Mail.)—Departure from here recently of the White Star liner Megantic for Liverpool by way of New Zealand, the Panama Canal, the West Indies and New York, recalls her historic forerunner of 1854.

This vessel, the Golden Age, was a wooden paddle-wheel steamer, belonging to the New York and Australian Steam Navigation Company. The intention of the company was to run six vessels "Via Panama," the Panama Railroad, capitalized at \$7,000,000, being the connecting link on the then undivided isthmus from Southampton.

The Crimean War, yellow fever on the isthmus and other causes, conspired to defeat the company's plans. The Golden Age was commanded by Lieutenant D. D. Porter, of the United States Navy, who afterwards became famous as a Union Admiral during the Civil war.

The Golden Age left Melbourne for Panama via Sydney and Tahiti, May 11, 1854. She reached Sydney on May 11 with 300 passengers. Her cargo included a consignment of gold dust and she reached England in 66 days.

Wednesday, October 15, 1919. Court met pursuant to adjournment when were present, Hon. R. H. Bunnell, County Judge, Burrell Short and Asa Fordyce, Commissioners, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the Application of Mrs. Olive May Ohles, for a Widow's Pension.

Order awarding pension. It appearing to the Court that the said Mrs. Olive May Ohles residing at Klamath Agency, Oregon, and is the mother of (1) one child under the age of sixteen years, whose name and age is, respectively:

Gladys Hester Ohles, born October 9, 1905, at Presley, Arkansas.

She is entitled to a Widow's Pension to assist in the support and maintenance of herself and such child whose name and age and the amount which should be allowed to each per month, respectively, is as follows:

Gladys Hester Ohles, age 14 years, \$10.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED AND ADJUDGED, That the said Mrs. Olive May Ohles be, and she is hereby allowed the sum of \$10 per month commencing November 1, 1919, until further order of this Court.

APPLICATION FOR RELIEF. It appearing to the Court from application on file that Mrs. Kate Mack is a single woman, and is without means of support, in consequence of sickness and age, and that she is in need of assistance for the care and support of herself.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, That Mrs. Kate Mack be, and she is allowed the sum of \$20 per month until further order of this Court.

In the Matter of a Lease on County Road.

This agreement made and entered into this 30th day of August, 1919, by and between the County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, its successors and assigns, hereinafter styled the lessor, and the United States, Herbert D. Newell, Project Manager of the United States Reclamation Service, thereunto fully authorized and subject to the approval of the proper supervisory officer, its successors and assigns, hereinafter styled the lessee.

WITNESSETH: that in pursuance of the authority contained in the Act of Congress approved June 17, 1902, (32 Stat. 388) and acts amendatory thereof, and supplementary thereto, the parties thereto have mutually covenanted and agreed and by these presents do covenant and agree as follows:

1. That for and in consideration of the payments hereinafter stipulated and agreed to be performed, the lessor hereby lets and leases unto

lessee, for use and occupation, one Western Steel Scraper Company's 10" x 18" jaw rock crusher on trucks with elevator and rotary screens, complete; two end dump cars and about 150 feet of tracks for same for the full period of four months, beginning September 2, 1919, to and including December 31, 1919.

2. It is understood and agreed that as complete compensation for the use and occupation of the equipment above enumerated, during the period of such use and occupation, and in full consideration and payment for the complete performance of the foregoing promises and agreements by the lessor, the lessee hereby promises and agrees to pay for such equipment at the rate of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) Dollars per month, the total sum to be paid to the lessor at the termination of the period of this lease for which the equipment hereinbefore described shall be used and occupied, except that the lessee will replace any and all hardware, which may be badly worn by the use and occupation of the aforementioned equipment, by the lessee and further agrees to replace any and all breakage caused by and at the instance of the lessee, its employees and servants during the life of this lease.

3. The officers acting for and on behalf of the lessee, or his successors in office, shall have the right, which he may at any time exercise, to terminate this agreement and lease at the end of any calendar month of said period upon giving the lessor thirty (30) days' written notice of his intentions so to do.

4. It is further understood and agreed that at the option of the lessee, with the approval of the lessor, the equipment hereinbefore enumerated may be left at the place of proposed use and occupation on and after December 31, 1919, until such time as notice is given to the lessor to the lessee requesting its return; Provided that when such notice is received by the lessee, it is hereby agreed that the said equipment will be returned and delivered up to the place of its present location, at the expense of the lessee, in as good order and condition as it now is, reasonable ordinary wear and tear thereof excepted.

5. The lessor expressly warrants that he has employed no third person to solicit or obtain this lease in its behalf, or to cause or procure the same to be obtained upon compensation in any way contingent, in whole or in part upon such procurement; and that it has not paid, or promised or agreed to pay, to any third person, in consideration of such procurement, or in compensation for services in connection therewith, any brokerage, commission or percentage; upon the amount receivable by it hereunder; and that it has not, in estimating the lease price demanded by it, included an amount by reason of any such brokerage, commission, or percentage; and that all monies payable to it hereunder are free from obligation to any other person for services rendered, or supposed to have been rendered, in the procurement of this lease. It is further agreed that any breach of this warrant shall constitute adequate cause for the annulment of this lease by the United States, and that the United States may retain to its own use from any sums due or to become due thereunder an amount equal to any brokerage, commission or percentage, so paid, or agreed to be paid; Provided, however, it is understood that this covenant does not apply to the selling of goods through a bona fide commercial representative employed by the lessor in the regular course of its business in dealing with customers other than the Government and whose compensation is paid, in whole or in part, by commissions on sales made, nor to the selling of goods through established commercial or selling agents or agencies regularly engaged in selling such goods.

6. No member or Delegate to Congress, or Resident Commissioner, after his election or appointment, or either before or after he has qualified and during his continuance in office, and no officer, agent, or employee of the Government shall be admitted to any share or part of this lease or agreement, or to any benefit to arise therefrom. Nothing, however, herein contained shall be construed to extend to any incorporated company, where such lease is made for the general benefit of such incorporation or company, as provided in Section 116 of the Act of Congress approved March 4, 1909 (35 Stat. 1109).

\$20,000 HOLSTEIN

Sealed bids will be received by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 10th day of May, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the City Hall in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered, for the purchase of \$50,735.00 City of Klamath Falls General Obligation bonds, payable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Oregon Fiscal Agency in New York, state of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said City as determined by the purchaser and the Common Council. These bonds are to be issued in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) each, and to be numbered from one (1) to fifty-one (51) inclusive.

Said bonds are to be issued in pursuance of Ordinance No. 493 of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
