WILEY AND THE SENATE

The following very complimentary mention of W. S. Wiley appeared in the Portland Telegram of the 24th. It is a source of much gratification to Mr. Wiley's friends to see him thus praised by one of the leading papers of the state and to know that his worth is recognized beyond the confines of the district he will represent.

Jay Upton, erstwhile political warhorse from Multnomah county, is headed again for the legislative corral. He is to come in this time from the Prineville range where, as it appears, he has been rusticiating for a period, so far as political activities are concerned.

In this particular campaign Jay Upton seeks to mill about in the senatorial circle, and in view of his former performances as a machine politician he doubtless responds to the signals flashed along the state line for the old warhorses to again get into service.

There is no necessity for Jay Upton in the senate so long as there are capable and untrammelled men to choose. Jay knows all the rules of the game as he learned to play here in Multnomah county, and he doubt-

less anticipates a win-in-a-walk out there in the sagebrush country. But we figure that clean capability and independence count for as much among the people of Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties as they do in this neck of the woods where the metropolis of the state happens to be located. Perhaps they count for more. At any rate, a man of that very type is available as an opponent to Jay Upton in the seventeenth senatorial district, and his name is Wilson S. Wiley.

As a primary qualification, Mr. Wiley has during a number of years acquired an experience which makes him in a large sense a man of affairs. His associations and connections have led him into and kept him in the larger view of constructive activities, and his work during a great part of his professional career in Oregon has marked him as a practical man who has had nothing to do with professional politics. He is a candidate for the senate at the present time because friends and fellow citizens in his district recognize in him the prime quality of service.

The men we need in the legislature are men of broad view, varied and practical experience, with a record of achievement outside of office seeking and office holding. Men of that kind are not to be influenced or controlled by the ringleaders and the manipulators. They are men who stand on their own feet and who will serve the state as a matter of conviction.

The Telegram expresses the hope that the voters of the seventeenth senatorial district will help make the next legislature a body composed of precisely such men. In the candidacy of Mr. Wilson S. Wiley the opportunity is theirs.

Sealed bids will be received by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 10th day of May, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the City Hall in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered, for the purchase of \$50,735.00 City of Klamath Falls General Obligation bonds, payable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Oregon Fiscal Agency in New York, state of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said City as determined by the purchaser and the Common Council. These bonds are to be issued in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) each, and to be numbered from one (1) to fifty-one (51) inclusive.

AVIATION EVENTS MANY IN 1920

NEW YORK, Apr. 28.—Air events planned for 1920 promise to make it a big aviation sport year, according to the American Flying Club. The first event of importance will be the flying field day of the Inercollegiate Flying Association at Mineola Field, (N. Y.) May 7. Eleven colleges and universities will be represented in a varied program of flying stunts, which will be concluded with a cross country flight. In this race each will be permitted to enter two airplanes and a cup will be awarded to the winner. The start will be made at Mineola Field, where the race also will end after a circuit that probably will include Philadelphia and Princeton.

Arrangements also are being made by the club for a seaplane race around Long Island. This probably will be held early in the summer. The club is co-operating with the training and operations group of the United States Air Service in planning for a trans-continental air race between New York and Alaska, a distance of 4,870 miles. In the tentative plans the course is mapped out from Mineola across United States territory to Minot, N. D., crossing to Saskatchewan, Can., and across the Dominion to Fort Egbert on the Alaska border. In Alaska the route runs to Circle, Fort Yukon, Fairbanks by way of Fort Gibbon, thence to Nulato and Nome. Compulsory stops at an average of each 150 miles will be arranged.

Flying events of a sporting nature will not be confined, however, to the United States in 1920. In France a flying meet is scheduled to be held at Juvisy, near Paris, May 22 and 23. The British aircraft exhibition will be held at London in July. In addition the British government has offered several millions in pounds as prizes for various airplane sporting events to be held during the year. The Cape to Cairo route is being blazed. Between the two points the distance by rail, steamship or ground transport is approximately 6,223 miles. The aerial line is about 5,200 miles.

The rowing season of the Columbia University crew will be started with a race with Yale over the Housatonic course this week.

Philadelphia's Director of Public Safety will be assisted by a committee of five in governing the boxing game in the Quaker city.

French boxing fans are keen for a bout between Jeff Smith and Georges Carpentier. Jeff's clever work in his recent fights has made a hit in Paris.

Now that the Fore River soccer team has disposed of its New York and Brooklyn rivals the next team to be tackled by the Quincy shipbuilders will be the Ben Millers of St. Louis.
