NEW SEA ROUTE TO LONELY ISLE

PAPEETE, Tahiti, Mar. 17. (By Mail).—The connection with civilization established through the opening of the Great Circle sea route from Panama to Australia may affect the communal life of the 250 residents of Pitcairn island, until recently one of the most lonely places in the world. For more than 100 years the islanders, descendants of white mutineers and Tahitian women and de-

vout members of the Seventh Day Adventist faith, have lived harmoniously in what the rare visitors regarded as a sort of Utopia.

Whenever a ship is sighted, the whole population turns out to gather vegetables, peaches, oranges and mangoes and by the time the ship has come close in, all is neatly packed in baskets and stowed aboard the two or three whale-boats at the landing place at the foot of the cliff. Whatever of provisions or clothing is taken in in exchange for their produce is immediately, on the return ashore, brought to the courthouse and there, under the direction of the magistrate of the island, divided equally among the 40 families.

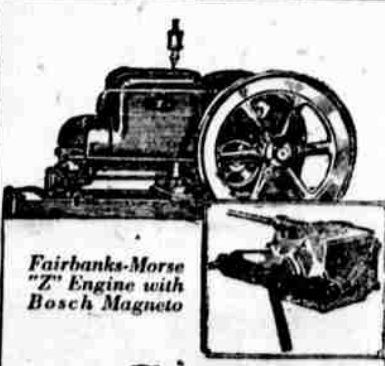
