COLORADO GAINS WATER SUPPLY

DENVER, Colo., Apr. 29.—The water supply stored on the various watersheds throughout the state this spring is greater than it was at the same time last, according to the report of snowfall in elevated regions of Colorado issued by the local office of the United States weather bureau.

While the snow on some of the watersheds is below normal, the amount on others is abnormally heavy. The average water content on the watersheds during March this year was 5.91 inches while in the

same month in 1919 it was only 5.13 inches.

The record snowfall occurred on the Yampa and White watershed where 48 inches, having a water content of 9.88 inches, fell. In the Gunnison district, a fall of 40 inches of snow was recorded. The Grand watershed also received an unusually heavy fall of snow while less than normal fell on the Arkansas and North Platte districts.

The seasonal flow in the Colorado river will be at least 30 per cent greater than normal, it is estimated.

VAUDEVILLE FOR THE MONDALE

Klamath Falls picture fans are going to be treated to another step forward in the development of the moving picture business in this city. The latest innovation is to be the inauguration of vaudeville by the Mondale theatre. Jack Monroe, owner of the Mondale, has associated with him Ted White, who will handle the bringing to this city the vaudeville acts that he is confident will command packed houses for the Mondale. Both Mr. and Mrs. White have had long experience before the footlights, and this they are going to use to good advantage in the selection of such acts as will insure success to what may be considered one of the most daring steps taken by picture houses in this city.
