WOMAN HEADS TURKISH BUREAU OF EDUCATION

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 16. (By Mail) A striking illustration of the general emancipation of Turkish women...

Mrs. Hanem is the wife of Dr. Adnan Bey, formerly president of the Turkish Red Crescent and until recently Mustapha Kemal's minister of health.

Shortly after Turkey entered the war the need for nurses became so great that women, for the first time, were permitted to accompany the armies and enter military hospitals as relief workers.

Mrs. Halide Edib Hanem is, perhaps, the most celebrated pioneer in the movement for the higher education of Turkish women.

Dr. Mary Mills Patrick, president of the college, and American diplomats in Turkey, always took a great interest in her struggle for education against such strong odds.

Industry—The labor question has a direct relation to industry and it is of an international nature.

JAPANESE SEEK AMITY WITH U. S.

TOKIO, March 15. (By Mail)—The conference just concluded here by the Japanese-American relations committee "made a beginning that may lead to a possible solution of some of the international difficulties between Japan and the United States," the committee announced.

This conference was an outgrowth of an initial meeting of representatives from both countries in Tokio in April, 1919. The Americans at the present conference, representing the Japanese relations committee of the San Francisco chamber of commerce, included Wallace M. Alexander, chairman; Dr. Benjamin Ide Wheeler, president emeritus of the University of California; William T. Seaton, Walton N. Moore, Loyall A. Osborne, Walter L. Clark and Captain Frederick H. Randall.

After meeting for several days with the Japanese representatives, headed by Baron Shibusawa, the committee summarized the results accomplished as follows: "Japanese ownership of land and immigration—These are the two vital questions which deeply concern the two peoples.

"Co-operation of capital—The best way to cement the relations of the two countries is to enter into economic relations. Such enterprises have already been started in Japan and the results are most satisfactory although there is plenty of margin for improvement and development.

"Cable communication—Cable communication falls far short of our expectations. No satisfactory communication on diplomacy or commerce can be carried on if it is left as it is now.

"Exchange professorships—Great benefit comes from exchange professorships. In order that this enterprise can be satisfactorily conducted it is important that certain universities be selected where the profes-
