

TO PURCHASE SEWER BONDS

Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 10th day of May, 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the City Hall in the City of Klamath Fals, Oregon, at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered, for the purchase of \$50,735,00 City of the purchase of \$50.735.00 City of Klamath Falls General Obligation bonds, Dayable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, in-terest payable semi-annually, princi-pal and interest payable at the Ore-gon Fiscal Agency in New York, state of New York, or at the office of the Treasurer of said City as determined by the purchaser and the Common Council. These bonds are to be issued in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1000,00) each, and to be numbered from one (1) to fifty-one (51) inclusive. Said bonds are to be issued in pur-

STAGE DIRECT TO SUSANVILLE, RENO

A stage service to Susanville, California, connecting there with stages and trains for the lumber town of Westwood and also with stage and S. P. for Reno. Stage connections are made at Susanville for Alturas, Adin, Fall River and McArthur,

The stages leave Klamath Falls from the City Transfer company's office Monday, Wednesday and Friday, making three trips weekly. Stages arrive Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The line as far as Bieber, Cal., is under the management of Webb Pinneo of this city, and from Bleber to Susanville it is operated by Long Brothers. The distance to Susanville is about 187 miles and is covered in two days, the overnight stop being at Bieber. The fare is

about \$18. The promoters of the line expect considerable patronage this summer from followers of the lumber industry, moving between the big mills at Westwood and Susanville and tributary points and the local mills and camps. The rail journey is a roundabout trip from Susanville via Reno to Sacramento, thence to Klamath Falls, and the fare is nearly three times the stage fare.
