WASHINGTON, May 7.—An additional 500,000,000 dollars during the year to finance construction of freight cars was asked of congress today by railroad executives.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Immediate amendment of the immigration laws was considered today at a special meeting of the senate immigration committee, called as a result of a ruling yesterday by Secretary Wilson that membership of the Communist party is alone an insufficient cause for deportation.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Studies of profiteering in American industry, made under the auspices of the railway brotherhoods, were presented to the railroad labor board today, in support of the railway workers' demands for higher pay and to refute the charge that increased labor costs are responsible for the higher cost of living.

BUTTE, May 7.—Following a decision reached last night when offers of compromise were refused, members of the Butte Workingmen's union struck this morning for a wage increase of a dollar a day.

HYDER, Alaska, May 7.—Order prevailed and living conditions were normal in Hyder on the arrival of the United States coast guard cutter Algonquin today. The vessel will continue its voyage to the Bering sea, after a visit here.

OREGON FLOUR FOR EGYPTIANS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—Even the far-away Egyptian gets a taste of Oregon's wheat and flour, for the Columbia-Pacific Shipping company is sending out four steamers loaded with these products in the next two months. Some conception of just how far products from this state travel for distribution may be gained from the week's summary of shipping activities prepared by the local chamber of commerce. No less than half a dozen vessels will sail from the Columbia river in a few weeks for the Orient, Great Britain, Australia and South America.

Growth of business is also indicated in the announcement just made by the Mann-Titus company, which has recently been appointed local agent for the Java-Pacific line. This company gives assurance that direct steamer service between Portland and The Netherlands is now guaranteed, providing sufficient tonnage is offered to bring the company's ships to this port.

The Portland manager of Rolph-Mills & Co. has also made known that negotiations have been concluded with steamship owners who will inaugurate sailings from Portland for French-Atlantic ports. Vessels will go on the run early in June.

Thirteen large steamships are scheduled to dock at the Portland municipal terminals for discharge and loading of cargo this month. Among the products to be taken away by them are grain, lumber, steel, phosphate rock and railroad ties. One of the vessels will bring in 500 cases of peanut oil.

\$18,000,000 DEFICIT
SANTIAGO, Chile, April 19. (By Mail.)—Chile's deficit for the fiscal year ended December 31 aggregates \$18,000,000, according to a statement by the finance minister, Guillermo Subercaseaux. This is attributed to the great decline last year in exportation of nitrate owing to the transportation difficulties and other causes. Chile expected to export in 1919 2,500,000 tons of nitrate but actually shipped only 900,000 tons.
