DOGS MUST HAVE CITY LICENSE TAG

Approximately 50 city licenses have been issued dog owners by Chief of Police Wilson since his recent warning that all unlicensed dogs would be shot. This is probably close to half the number of dogs in the city. The chief believes that everyone has had fair warning and in a few days will begin rounding up stray and unlicensed dogs and disposing of them in accordance with the ordinance.

Some owners are apparently confused in regard to the necessity of paying both state and city licenses. The purchase of the state license is a separate transaction and does not protect the dog kept within the city limits from execution by the police officers if it is not also provided with a city license tag.
