**LEGION SUPPORTS
 "BIG BROTHER" PLAN**

OPPEKA, May 5.—Twenty-eight
 American Legion posts in Kansas al-
 together have pledged their co-
 operation in the "big brother" plan in-
 stituted by Capt. William F. Mac-
 Donnell, superintendent of the state in-
 stitute school for boys here. When
 a boy is paroled by the institution,
 his name and essential facts con-
 cerning him are forwarded to the
 commander of the local post in the
 city or town to which the boy is
 going. The commander appoints a
 Legion member to act as "big brother"
 to the boy.

"Ideas have been excellent," said
 Capt. MacDonnell. "These ex-service
 men give the paroled boys advice,
 show them the way, receive their
 letters from school, and in various
 ways help them to make good."
 The plan has been endorsed by the
 state board of administration.
