COMBINE BUYING TO REDUCE LIVING COST

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Six hundred customs house employes here are planning a system of co-operative buying in an effort to reduce living costs. A movement for an "overall club" is also being discussed.

The buying plan contemplates an initial charge of \$2.50 to each member for a revolving fund. Groceries are to be purchased from samples displayed in a room at the customs house and orders delivered there each Wednesday.

Women are now liable to be summoned to serve on juries in England, but to be qualified for such service a woman must occupy a house of the taxable value of \$150 in London or \$100 in the country.
