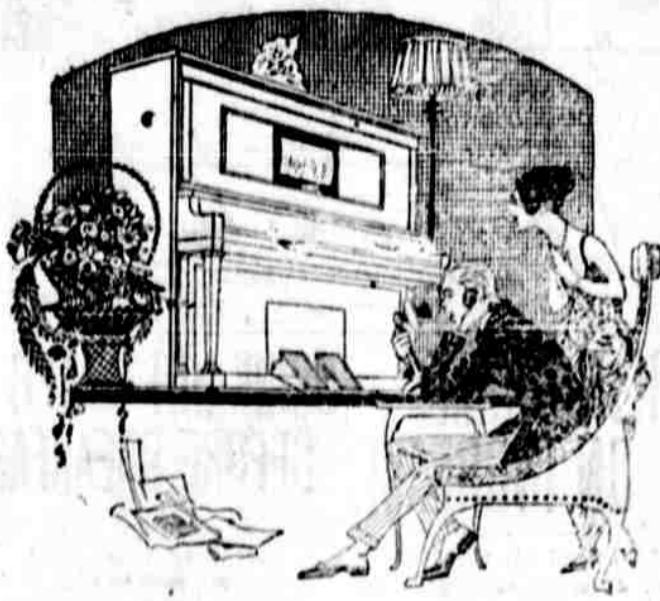

**ELECTRICAL DRIVEN SAW MILL.** Carriage made by McDonough Mfg. Co., left-hand, five-block, 45-inch. Main carriage has four blocks, with fifth block on trailer. Sticks 24-in. x 36-in. x 70 ft. have been sawed on this carriage. All steel set work, with roller, 1-32-in. and equipped with friction recoder. 16-inch wheels, 2 11-16-inch axles, double trucks under each head-block. Wrought steel huses and cast steel knees. Double-toothed dogs. Rolled steel rack.

About two million feet have been cut on this carriage, and it is in first-class condition.

# HIRAM JOHNSON BELIEVES IN AMERICAN WOMANHOOD

EXTRACTS FROM THE CARNEGIE HALL SPEECH OF THE REPUBLICAN PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE TO THE WOMEN OF NEW YORK

"There is a place for women in the politics of the land and in governmental affairs. This, long ago, we demonstrated in the state from which I come. Women were there, while I was governor in 1911, granted the right to franchise and for nearly ten years now, with a discrimination and an intelligence equal to men, have exercised that right.

"Not alone have they exercised that right, but immediately after suffrage was adopted those of us in charge of government in California availed ourselves of the peculiar talent of women in certain directions in carrying out our humanitarian program there.

"I had the pleasure of appointing the first wholly women's board in the United States, that which superintended and managed the girls' school at Ventura, Calif., and the management of that school under women's direction equaled in efficiency and accomplishment the management of the boys' reform schools under the management of men.

"It was a woman in California, who, as a member of the Minimum Wage Commission, brought employer and employe together and carried out a plan by which women in industry were given a living wage, and carried out the plan so successfully that it won the commendation, not only of the helpless women it was designed to benefit, but of the employing class too.

"Upon the Immigration and Housing Commission, which gave to those in seasonal employment better living conditions, women did a great part of the work. Our mother's pension, by which we sought to have reared in their homes, children of parents who had little, was administered by women.

"The child labor laws, under the direction of the labor department, was carried out successfully by women deputies.

"Of course, upon the State Board of Education, directing all the educational affairs of the commonwealth, women played their part and held their high place.

"On the Board of Charities and Corrections, dealing with conditions in state institutions, women members, equally with men, brought institutional life of the state to its present excellent condition.

"In many activities, particularly those where the welfare of the women and children were involved, women have played their proud part in the triumphant progress of our state. They have added to the efficiency of our government. They have participated, not as a class in our political governmental affairs, but they have participated as an integral part of our citizenship.

"We learned during the recent war of the service women could render in what was presumed to be man's separate field. In our state we have learned that in what a few decades ago was presumed to be man's domain alone, women can render a like service and in many instances a better service than men.

"There is service for all the nation now. A niche for every man and woman within it. There is service for all in this great government, with its multitudinous and diverse activities, and now we have availed ourselves of the service, not alone of half of our people, but finally of the service of all our people, men and women alike."
