We can hope for but a tight vote in the other counties. Upton and his friends are leaving nothing undone to roll up the big majority he must have to win. Don't let him have any Klamath county votes in that majority. Upton is a slick campaigner and a practical politician. He has left nothing undone to win votes. Let Klamath county do the same thing for Wiley that Upton expects his own and neighboring counties for himself. Klamath county needs Wiley. Go to the polls next Friday and see that she gets him.

Let this be a Klamath county year—a year when we are going to need and elect men who will help us build the county. We are going to need money out of that \$25,000,000 annual appropriation that congress is going to vote for reclamation purposes. Let us go after enough of it to finish our project. Because we did not have real representation, the reclamation service stole the money from Oregon to complete pet projects. Now we have real representation in senate and house and let us keep it. When you vote for Sinnott you vote for the millions that we must have to complete the Klamath project. Will you do it?

Klamath Falls is going to need a lot of help in Washington one of these days and it is going to need it mightily badly. Who, we would ask, will be in a better position to give it than Congressman Sinnott, one of the most influential men in Washington? Then why try to destroy that which we will need by trying to

pull down the man who has shown he has our interests at heart? That is what you would do if you voted against Mr. Sinnott. No one doubts for a minute but he will be nominated and elected by an overwhelming majority, but this does not alter the fact that a vote against him weakens him just that much. Let us do what every congressional district in the United States does when they have a man in congress who can do things for his constituents, let us wipe out every vestige of opposition to him. Let us send Mr. Sinnott a message through the ballot box that will say: "Nick, old boy, you have stood by us and we stand by you. We are going to need your help and we know we'll get it."

A WORD TO THE WISE

There is a bill before congress that provides for the appropriation of \$25,000,000 annually for 10 years, to be used in completing old reclamation projects, starting new ones and opening up public lands. In the past, money appropriated for these purposes that should have been given to Oregon has gone to other states, because the other states had influence enough in congress to get it. They grabbed everything in sight and for the past several years there has been nothing for Oregon to get, with the result that the Klamath project remains about one-eighth completed. Now, however, with this \$25,000,000 in sight, we will get what we are entitled to if we have sense enough to work for our own interests. Today Oregon is the most powerful state in the union so far as controlling the expenditure of this money is concerned. She holds the chairmanships of the public lands committee in the house and the irrigation committee in the senate and is thereby in a position to dictate. Is there anyone in Klamath county so blind to the interests of his community that he will vote against Sinnott, who is chairman of the public lands committee of the house? It makes no difference whether you are a Republican, a Democrat, or belong to no party. You are a resident of Klamath, with its welfare at heart. That being true you cannot afford to place any obstacle in its path. A vote against Mr. Sinnott would be a vote against your own interests, the interests of your neighbors, your community.

The bigger the vote for Sinnott, the bigger will be his prestige in Washington. The Klamath project is going to need millions to complete it. Sinnott is the man to get it for us. Let us build up his strength by making his vote unanimous in Klamath county. Then we can go to him with clean hands and ask his help.

Take an interest in the selection of your candidates for the legislature. Pick the men who will do the most for Klamath county. Those men are Wiley, Overturf and Brattain.

D. 1920, between the hours of two o'clock p. m. and seven o'clock p. m., there will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$37,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing Block 5 of Fairview Addition to Klamath Falls for a school site, erecting a school house thereon, and improving the grounds in and for said school district.
