AT THE THEATERS

Successor to "Shore Acres" and "Way Down East," in the classical character of its theme and story, the Buffalo Motion Picture Corporation's production of "The Price of Innocence," with Stella Talbot, will be presented at the Star Theatre, starting Sunday.

Unwilling to yield to her sincerity and the realization that her sacrifice had been made for them, they drive her back to the mainland. There, in a resumption of her acquaintance with Greyson, she discovers that the island, to which he claims title, had been legally deeded to the "squatters" by his father, just before the elder Greyson had been killed in an accident.

Despite the unmerited disgrace and slander her kinsmen had heaped upon her she returns again to "Goose Island" to tender them the document which would end forever the feud between the "squatters" and Greyson. In the tumble-down cabin of Sam Durkin, leader of the bigotry against her, occurs one of the sensational moments of the production. Infuriated by her return, unwilling to heed explanations, the islanders attempt to brand her with a red hot crossbar.
