DEFEAT OF BILL WOULD EXILE OREGON YOUTH

More serious than the loss of the faculty material at the state institutions, should the millage bill 310 (X) yes fail, is "What would become of the students?" The voters of Oregon are more concerned with this phase of the situation as the students are the boys and girls of the voters of Oregon.

The numbers enrolled at the campus—not including medical students, law students, extension students, summer course students, short course students, farmer's week students or any other except regular four-year students resident at the institutions themselves—were as follows: 1914, 2,162; 1920, 5,408. An increase of 150 per cent.

As against this increase in resident full term enrollment the figures for the taxes levied for 1914 and 1919 for the identical purposes contemplated by the existing millage: 1914, \$986,505; 1919, \$1,214,929. An increase of 22 per cent.

Thus, and a 22 per cent increase of revenues, the institutions are managing to care for a 150 per cent increase of student enrollment at a time when the purchasing power of a dollar is little more than half it was at the earlier period. Only the loyalty of the teaching staff has made this possible. The amount of instruction work done from early morning until late at night, and the equipment and classroom space, have been all out of proportion. Should the institutions be deprived of adequate revenues, the greater part of this heavy student enrollment would find itself out in the cold so far as proper instruction was concerned.

It is estimated that between 1,000 and 1,500 students would be compelled to seek their higher education elsewhere.

U. S., CANADA FARMERS JOIN

CHICAGO, May 17.—The formation of an international board of agriculture to promote firmer co-operation between American and Canadian farmers: the organization of a campaign for passage by congress of the Capper-Hersman bill, providing collective bargaining for farm groups and consideration of presidential candidates, leading to a possible endorsement by the farm interests, were discussed today at a meeting of the national board of farm organizations and agricultural leaders in Canada.

A committee, of which the Canadians were members, adopted resolutions advising the establishment of an international farm bureau. Another committee will be appointed to arrange for the organization of the board.

The publicity department of the meeting said that 75 per cent of the farmers affiliated with the national board are in favor of Hiram Johnson. The board claims a membership of 2,000,000 farmers in its affiliated organizations.

Each of the farmers' organizations represented at the meeting will send a delegation to Chicago at the time of the Republican national convention to urge the adoption of planks favorable to the farming interests in the Republican platform. Whether any one candidate would be endorsed would be decided at that time.

A committee was named to attend the Republican national convention as representative of the farmers' organizations. The body was directed to ask legislation to facilitate the organization of co-operative consumers' and producers' organizations and to urge penalties against railroads which discriminate against co-operation farm organizations in supplying cars.

2 MILLION DOLLAR LUMBER PLANT

ASTORIA, Ore., May 15.—The largest lumbering plant in America is to be brought to Astoria through an option just secured by R. A. Booth and Amadee M. Smith on 150 acres of land owned by the Astoria Marine Iron works. The deal involves payment of \$150,000 for the property, which is on Youngs Bay, but the total investment, including the erection of a mill, is expected to reach the \$2,000,000 mark.

FIRM SUPPLIES 15 HOMES A WEEK

PORTLAND, May 17.—Knock-down houses to the number of at least 15 a week are to be turned out from the local factory of the Alladin company, largest manufacturers of ready-made dwelling in the world, which began operations here this week. Already a number have been sold and shipped. Nine western states and western Canada compose the distributing area of the new branch.

Portland mills are supplying rough lumber for the Alladin mill and cut-up factory. The frame factory has been in operation since the first of the year, but the actual preparation of houses did not begin until May.

One hundred and ten people are now employed at the plant, but the staff will increase as production speeds up. Manager Porter, who is going east shortly, expects to confer with the company officials relative to establishing a sash and door plant also in connection with the Portland factory.

ARGENTINE WORKERS CALL CONVENTION

BUENOS AIRES, April 16. (By Mail).—The Argentine Patriotic league, a citizens' organization, has called a congress of workers to be held here in May, in an effort to free Argentine laborers from the spirit of Bolshevism which was manifested recently in an attempt to start a communist revolution.

It is proposed to agitate for improved labor legislation and to discuss ways and means of bettering the condition of the workers through pacific methods. Representatives of every union in the country have been invited.
