ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR GETTING VOTERS TO POLLS

Cars will be provided tomorrow for voters who have no cars of their own and who cannot afford to spare a great deal of time from their daily tasks for voting. Plenty of cars will be available and they will be directed from a central headquarters in De Lap & Hayden's office, 315 Main street, phone 387. This office is opposite the court house.

Notaries will be on hand there to "swear in" non-registered voters who can prove by two witnesses their residence qualification—six months in Oregon. County and precinct residence qualification is not necessary under the Oregon law. Remember this—that if qualified by six months residence in Oregon all that is necessary is to call 372 and notary services and a car for transportation to your precinct polling place will be furnished.

Auxiliary headquarters will have cars at Sixth and Main for the convenience of voters of the labor organizations. These will be handled from the office of the central labor council, phone 372.

The cars will be available from 8 o'clock, the hour the polls open, until 8 in the evening when they close. Voters who have no means of transportation can secure a car simply by phoning 387 or 372.

Women voters should arrange their household work so that they may ballot early.

KING DOES NOT FEAR OUTCOME

Trench King, the Sacramento boy who is to meet Joe Souza at Klamath Falls, in the main event at the boxing exhibition at Houston's opera house tomorrow night, arrived on last night's train and was up bright and early this morning sizing up the general situation.

King is young, hard and full of confidence. He has been in the ring upwards of 30 times in the year since he started boxing and has only had three adverse decisions. He feels confident that he will stop Souza, stating that he has been up against fighters of equal rating and pointing to a decision secured over Babe Hermann, Souza's brother, as an instance that he has had experience with the family.

Eddie Murphy, the local boxer, will be King's corner during the battle.

The other exhibitions are shaping up according to schedule and all promises well for a good bunch of bouts. Fans are interested in the second preliminary between Red Moore and Joe Blackburn, evenly matched contestants, with a scrapping reputation.

The ticket sale is going well at the Rex cafe and the card, which contains 24 rounds of boxing, promises to draw a capacity house.

MARSHALL STANDS FOR EQUAL JUSTICE

NEW ORGAN IS IN AT LIBERTY

ELEMENTARY TAX SHOULD HAVE UNITED SUPPORT

It is entirely in the hands of the voters, whether every school in this state opens its doors in September or whether at least 150 close for lack of sufficient funds to pay operating expenses.

The children's bill or properly speaking the elementary educational bill will be a great step in the right direction. It provides that every cent of the wealth of the state is available for the elementary schools. Every county receives the exact amount of taxes collected in that county. But the splendid feature of the bill is the manner of its distribution, on the teacher basis so that the small rural school of 15 pupils will receive the same amount as the school of 30 or less. It is a well known fact that the operating expenses of a school of five pupils are as great as those of 1 to 25, providing, of course that it is a one room school, for the greatest expenditure is for teacher's salary.

By this method of distribution, the small struggling district of low valuation will receive a splendid aid in maintaining its school. After all, education must not be confined to boundary limits. Why should a child be deprived of the best educational opportunities just because he happened to be born on one side of an imaginary boundary line. You, as a parent or as a citizen, are vitally concerned. It is to your advantage to help give all children equal and the best opportunities, the opportunities of well equipped schools and well trained teachers.

It is not laying a heavier burden of taxation upon you, in fact in countless instances it is actually helping to lift the load, for in our own county it is making the revenue of the \$3,000,000 valuation which is now in no organized school district, available for school taxation.

After all, it revolves itself in the question—are you a friend of education? If so you will come out and vote yes on bill No. 314, the elementary educational bill.

Considerable interest has been stirred up in the last 16 days by the energetic campaign of the Johnson-for-President committee, and supporters of General Wood and Governor Lowden have also been busy. The senatorial contest between William S. Wiley of Klamath Falls and Jay Upton of Prineville for the Republican nomination has also roused considerable interest.

All indications point to a heavy vote throughout the county, as most voters apparently realize the importance not only of securing a local man to represent Klamath county's interests in the state senate but also the vital issues that hand upon the nation's choice of a president this year.

TWELVE KILLED IN RIOTING IN W. VA. COAL TOWN

MATEWAN, West Va., May 20.—With a hundred armed deputy sheriffs patrolling the streets and a detachment of the state constabulary expected momentarily, the situation in this mining village, where the scene of the killing of twelve persons last night in a battle between private detectives and citizens, was quiet early today.

Last night's shooting, according to authorities, resulted from the action of detectives who evicted a number of miners from the Stone Mountain Coal company's houses.

A shot, said to have been fired by Albert Felts, detective, which ended the life of Mayor Cabell Testerman, started the battle. Felts was killed an instant afterward by the chief of police.

The shooting then became general, seven detectives, four miners and the mayor losing their lives. Others were badly wounded.

CHAUTAUQUA STARTS MONDAY

Klamath Falls' annual Chautauqua, the good time week for all, opens Monday afternoon. The big tent will be erected on the carnival grounds on Klamath avenue, between Seventh and Eighth.
