DAVID STARR JORDAN PRESENTS FISH RELICS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, May 22.—Sixty hitherto unknown species of fossil fishes of the Miocene age that lived in bays which in prehistoric times covered the land now included in Los Angeles, Orange and Santa Barbara counties, Calif., have been added to the scientific world through the recent efforts of Dr. David Starr Jordan, chancellor emeritus of Stanford University. Stanford collection of fossil fishes of this age is now larger than that of all institutions put together, numbering about four hundred.

These fishes probably lived 2,000,000 years B. C., long before the glacial area and many hundred thousand years before the advent of man, Dr. Jordan said.

LUMBER CUT NEARS NORMAL

PORTLAND, May 22.—The aggregate volume of lumber produced at 125 mills reporting to the barometer of the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ended May 3 was 88,629,266 feet, which was only 3,562,724 feet or 3.89 per cent below normal. The mills have been maintaining this high average of production for the last two or three months. They have been able, thus, to restock their yards.

During the same period the total volume of new business accepted by the same group of mills was approximately 55,000,000 feet of which 43,020,000 feet were destined for rail delivery. The rail shipments for the week were 1,275 cars or 57,750,000 feet.

Export shipments continued heavy, as they have been for the last few months. The movement for the week was 5,153,619 feet; the domestic cargo movement was 8,348,990 feet. Shipments of all kinds—cargo, rail and local—aggregated 76,500,325 feet.

MORE RICE THIS YEAR IN TEXAS

BEAUMONT, Texas, May 22.—The present outlook points to an increased rice production this year over the crop of 1919, E. A. Eignus, manager of the Southern Rice Growers' association declared. He had this to say regarding this year's rice crop.

"The weather has been very dry over the entire belt with the exception of a fair rain between Eagle Lake and Bay City. On account of the dry and continued north winds, particularly in Texas, the ground is very rough and it is almost impossible for farmers to prepare a seed bed.

"In Louisiana, the condition on the whole, is better than in Texas. From Welsh to Rayne, embracing a large part of the Louisiana rice territory, the farmers have probably more planted than is usual at this time of year. There will undoubtedly be some increase in acreage over the entire belt if heavy rains do not prevent planting. From one source and then another, the farmers have succeeded in scraping up plenty of seed.

"The market is slightly better and there is a noticeable reaction from the quietness caused by transportation difficulties. Dealers have been afraid to buy for export on account of the danger of not being able to make deliveries. Inquiries from Porto Rico are on the increase and outlook in that section is better. There is little rice remaining in the hands of the farmers."
