LOGGING CAMPS MAY PRODUCE NEXT CHAMPION

PORTLAND, May 24.—The next heavyweight champion pugilist of the world may be recruited from the logging camps or lumber mills of the Pacific Northwest.

Since the International Sporting Club of New York has determined to arrange a series of elimination contests to select the best man in the lumber industry, a keen rivalry has tilters. It is probable that the first preliminary bouts will be held sometime this summer.

The mettle of the lumbermen has been further aroused by the announcement that a member of the British parliament has offered \$50,000 for the purpose of developing an English heavyweight who can take the title away from Jack Dempsey, the present holder.

Major Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, president of the International Sporting Club, has been working with Robert B. Allen, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumberman's association, in his ambition to get the loggers and lumbermen of the Northwest fully interested.

"I am grateful for your efforts to bring to light the men who are likely to develop high-class qualities as heavyweight boxers," says Major Biddle in a letter just received by Mr. Allen.

"A member of the English parliament has contributed the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of discovering the English heavyweight who will wrest the world's championship from the present holder—Jack Dempsey. Elimination bouts are being conducted in the English mining districts, lumber camps, shipbuilding yards and elsewhere where powerfully built men are working. France under patronage of leading sports men, is developing much promising material.

"America, from the point of numbers, has never been so poorly represented as it is in this class today, there being only two outstanding representatives—Dempsey and Fulton. The International Sporting Club has considered it part of its mission and its purpose to do everything possible to see that this, the most important championship of all, shall not be neglected."

The International Sporting Club is arranging similar contests in various other industries and from all the talent thus developed hopes to bring forth a new world's champion.

Several likely candidates for the honor of representing the lumber industry of the Northwest already are in training on Grays Harbor, in Washington, and in the Willamette Valley in Oregon.

The Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen are interested and probably will unearth a few first-class mitt-artists of their own.

500 MAIL PLANES TO HAVE BASIS AT OMAHA

OMAHA, Nebr., May 24.—Omaha is to become within two years a base depot for 500 mail planes, according to Col. J. I. Jordan, chief of construction and extension of the air mail service.

Each of the planes to be used in the New York-San Francisco mail service and the radiating branches is to be so constructed that within a day it could be transformed into fighting aircraft, he said.

"In case of trouble a battle plane converted here could reach coast or border in from 15 to 20 hours," he added.

Col. Jordan, who is on an inspection tour of landing fields, predicted that within a year mail will be transported from coast to coast in 36 hours. The plans contemplate that, he said.

RECORD FLYING FISH TAKEN AT GALVESTON

GALVESTON, Tex., May 24.—What is said to be one of the largest flying fish captured in tropical Atlantic waters, measuring 28 inches between wing tips, has been presented to H. H. Morris of this city by Captain S. H. McDonald, master of a fishing smack. The fish, which has not been classified yet, was captured in the vicinity of the Campeche Banks, off the coast of Mexico.

The largest flying fish captured in the Atlantic ocean, which is on display in the Smithsonian Institution, according to Mr. Morris, measures 16 1/2 inches between wing tips, while the largest fish of this type from the Pacific waters measures 18 inches.

PROTECTION OF FORESTS URGED

Do you know that May 23 to 29 is Forest Protection Week?

Eight western states are observing it and in no other state is there as much reason for such observation as in Oregon.

With standing timber worth 3-4 billion dollars; 45,000 people employed in the lumber industry, and the industry producing a product which puts 50 million dollars annually in circulation here, every man, woman and child has a stake in Oregon's forests.

Do you know that already four million acres of Oregon's timber has been destroyed by fire? And do you realize what this means in increased taxes and shorter life for the industry? Unquestionably the time has come when we have no more timber to waste. Thousands of dollars are annually expended to prevent fire but active public support is needed to eliminate the fire hazard in so far as this can be done by human agencies.

A great part of the population of Oregon use the forests for recreation or profit. Very few people nowadays are indifferent to the damage done by fire. But there are also few who actively help in seeing that our laws are observed and that public officials use the powers conferred upon them to help reduce our annual losses of timber.

The purpose of Forest Protection Week is to endeavor to make Oregonians realize the need for care with fire and help make 1920 a year of little or no losses.

Our lumber industry is expanding and our tourist trade growing. Help both by observing the following rules when in the mountains this summer:

Throw pipe ashes and cigar or cigarette stubs in the dust of the road, or, better still, pinch them out between your fingers. Do not throw them into brush or leaves.

Never build a camp fire against a tree or log, in leaf mould, or in rotten wood. Build all fires away from overhanging branches and on a dirt or rock foundation.

Never leave a camp fire, even for a short time, without completely extinguishing every spark with water or fresh dirt free from moss and leaf mould.

Try to put out any fire that you find. If you cannot put it out, get word to the nearest forest officer.

Help enforce the fire laws; they were made to protect your interests.

RENT LOWERS BIRTHRATE

DENVER, Colo., May 24.—High rents cause low birthrates, declared the Rev. Dr. Nutting Bascomb, pastor of the Plymouth Congregational church of this city, in a conference

on "Mile High Rents" in his church. "Young people cannot get married because they have no place in which to live and in this way the birth rate is kept below normal," he said.
