SOVIET ASK CHINA TO BANISH EXILES

PEKING, April 29. (By Mail.)—The Soviet authorities at Irkutsk, Siberia, have asked the Chinese government to banish from China the diplomats and consuls of the Old Russian government who have continued to live in China since the overthrow of Emperor Nicholas. The request is signed by M. Janson, delegate of the Council of Commissaries in Siberia and the Far East.

The Soviet note declares that these diplomats and consuls still are being supported by the payment to them by the Chinese of that portion of the Boxer indemnity allotted to Russia but this source of support would be cut off by the soviet government's renunciation of further

payments of that indemnity. The Soviet note adds:

"The powers given to these officers of the former Emperor have long ceased to exist but the officers continue to live in their houses and to fool the Chinese with the assistance of Japan and the Allies. The Chinese people should take cognizance of this fact and banish these liars and fools from their territory."
