### EIGHTH ST. OWNERS PROTEST NUISANCE

#### Wire Cutting Ordinance

An ordinance, approved by the local managers of the power, telephone and Western Union companies, was introduced, regulating the cutting of wires to permit the moving of houses, dredgers, etc., along the public streets. Among requirements are 48 hours notice to the company owning the wires to be cut and payment of the estimated cost of the work of cutting and repairing the wires.

After the work is done any balance due one side or the other on the estimate will be paid.

#### Dancing Platform

C. F. Parker was granted permission for the erection of a dance platform at the corner of Pine and Seventh streets, the corner back of Underwood's pharmacy, until October 1, 1920. The floor will be 60 by 95 feet in area and the cost \$1,000. The council gave the matter some consideration as protests have been made

against the establishment of a dancing pavilion in this residence neighborhood, but no one appeared before the council to protest the petition. The city will have the use of the platform when wanted for band concerts, Fourth of July exercises and other public gatherings.

#### Permits Granted

I. W. Goodard was granted permission, after a record vote, to move a small lunch counter from lot 7 block 38, Main street, to a new location on Main street, east of Hector's store.

A permit was issued to Father H. J. Marshall for the new Catholic school which will be erected at a cost of \$75,000 at the corner of Jefferson and Eighth streets.

J. B. Auten, of the Acme Motor company, was granted a permit for the new garage at Sixth and Oak streets. The building is to be brick and concrete construction with a floor space 100 by 204 feet.

Fred Buesing was granted a permit to remove a frame building from lot 2, block 39, original town, to lot 6, block 3, Canal addition.

Mrs. Mary C. Helms was granted permission to conduct a rooming house in the Mary Jackson apartments at 1177, Esplanade street.

#### Park Site Sold

An ordinance empowering the measure to deliver to Ackley Bros. the city park site on the Ewauna lake front, partly adjoining the Ackley mill site, was passed to its second reading. The price to be paid for the park ground is \$10,500, which

will be used by the city in buying another site.
