ISLAND SHIPMENTS TO U. S. ARE SCARCE

MANILA, P. I., Apr. 29. (By Mail.)—Cargo ships are leaving Manila frequently with their holds practically empty, shipping agents say, because of adverse market conditions in the United States. The low price of hemp and coconut oil, two of the leading articles of export from the Philippines, is one of the principal factors in causing the surplus of cargo space, shippers assert.

Because of the large stocks of these products accumulated during the war, both here and in the United States, a surplus has been created and it is said they may now be purchased at a lower price in the United States than in the Philippines.

As an instance of what risks natives employed in the diamond-diggers in South Africa will run in order to conceal diamonds, it is stated that, on a post-mortem examination being made on a native who died under suspicious circumstances, a sixty carat rough diamond was found in his stomach.

TRAVELER SEES STRANGE SIGHTS

It wildly on my chop stick. I spoke of "other things" with the waitress that the time had come. When my host's attention had been sufficiently distracted, I eased the little bird gently to the floor. One has no napkins with which to cover such vagaries of the appetite, as the practical Chinese recognizing the need of something more substantial, provide one with a towel wrung from boiling water. This towel seems to appear just as the grease, all the food is very greasy, had begun to clog, and is very acceptable. The last thing on the menu was a bowl of rather starchy looking fluid into which we put rice and nuts. This was very good and as it was eaten with a little China spoon I was able to take a little nourishment.

Winter in Shanghai is just as cold as the summers are hot, and one shivers over the tiny fireplaces which our English cousins who were here first, and who are responsible for most of the architecture here, seem to think sufficient.

Easter time the whole office force, including the Chinese, went to Hangchow, one of the most historical spots near Shanghai. It is about four and one-half hours' ride from here, and is situated on a very pretty lake. It surely did seem good to see some clear water, as the creeks and rivers near Shanghai are so muddy and so filled with junk that one can't enjoy being on or near them. About 250 years ago, during the reign of the Ming, the emperor lived at Hangchow, and we were shown the gardens and other places of interest about the place. From the hill where the highest summer house was situated one could look across the lake and see a good bit of the surrounding country. We spent one whole day on the lake in a small boat going from shrine to shrine and saw some of the smaller temples. The larger temples were a chair ride of about two hours up into the hills. Three of the larger temples were the "Girl" temples, or temples built in memory of a nun, or as our guide said, "female monk."

As it was this girl's birthday there was a stream of country people and others more pretentiously arrayed going up to these temples. Everywhere could be seen women and men kneeling in front of these altars where there are hundreds of candles burning. The women, we were told, were praying the Chinese woman's prayer that they might be men in the next life. There were the money changers in the temples as in Christ's time, and the merchants, too. The most wonderful thing near Hangchow is the "flying hill" as it is called. The legend is that this hill was on the other side of the lake, and one morning it appeared on the side where it now stands. There are 513 images carved in the rock of the hillside. The story is that each sculptor in the vicinity had a dream, the same dream, that he had been working hard all night carving these figures. The next morning, meeting other members of his profession, he told them of his dream, and they said, "How queer," for each had had the same dream. Then they all went to look at the hill, and sure enough the figures were carved in the solid rock as they had dreamed. This hill is known to have been covered with these images for 2,000 years at least, and a temple has been built nearby with a copy of these images in wood, covered with gold. There are the same number as on the hill, and some of them are quite terrible to behold, so frightful is their expression. One of our party, an older Chinese, paid some soul money at one of the temples. A receipt on a piece of red paper was given him. We were told that this was to insure his happiness in a future life. The priests were very well and appropriately gowned in gray and looked like very intelligent fellows. Tea was served at every temple and one dropped money into the many money boxes with which the temples were well provided. The way up to the temples was lined with beggars, some having leprosy and others lame and blind.

Since getting back here in August I have been over to Japan and have made seven round trips between here and Tientsin and Peking. The first trip up, in August, was as hot as Shanghai. Some different from the last time I had been there when it was snowing heavily. Tientsin and Peking are about 1,000 miles north of Shanghai, and Tientsin is the port for all of North China. It is a city of about 1,500,000 population, with a foreign population of about 10,000. The various nations have their own concessions where the laws of each nation only apply. This is different from Shanghai where the foreigners live in an international settlement governed by themselves, and is in

really a whole nation by itself. Peking, the capital of China, is not a treaty port, and the laws of China apply, except in the various embassies. Peking is one of the greatest show places of the world, and the coloring is really marvelous. Everything is on a very immense scale. I have not been up in the interior of China this trip, but the last time I was here I was 1,100 miles inland as well as through Korea, Manchuria and Siberia. I believe I told you a good deal about these trips when I saw you last year.

I have been a long time getting to this letter but trust that it will be of interest in spite of its tardiness.

FRANKLIN LEGACY TO BE USED BY CITY

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—A bequest of \$1,000 by Benjamin Franklin to the city of Philadelphia in 1790 to be used after 100 years "to make living in town more convenient and render it more agreeable to strangers," is to be applied by the board of city trusts to the erection of public comfort stations. The bequest now amounts to \$66,323 while a similar legacy from John Scott of \$3,000 in 1816 has increased to \$14,085. The board decided to apply both funds for the purpose stated upon recommendation of Mayor Moore.

\$400,000 PACKING PLANT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—On a six acre tract recently purchased in north Portland by the Sterrett Packing company a new \$400,000 plant is soon due to rise. The concern has an annual output of a million dollars worth of meats. Plans for the new building have already been approved and construction will begin before July 1.
