EVICTED SCORES LIVE IN TENTS

NEWARK, N. J., May 26.—One hundred and ten families, evicted by landlords, are comfortably housed in Vallsburgh Park today under tents loaned to the city of Newark by the war department. It is a real Tentville whose denizens, although temporarily homeless, are happy as could be expected in a community forced to live outdoors. It is expected that, before the end of summer, 300 families will have joined the little colony.

Captain Thomas W. Reilly, a machinegun man with a fine overseas record, laid out the place and gave each arrival a first come, first served choice of their canvas habitation. One of them was a young widow with four children. She received an order to vacate her apartment after failing to defeat her landlord in a lawsuit.

The city appropriated \$25,000 for the operation of the camp and Governor Edwards donated a big tent which, in the center, serves as a community kitchen. Army food from the municipal sales stations helps further to keep down the cost of living. The new settlement is provided with many conveniences including a sewerage system, running water, a laundry tent equipped with tubs and stoves for ironing, shower baths and toilets.

The total cost of installing the improvements was less than \$500, according to Captain Reilly, the largest single item being \$120 for heavy insulated wire for electric lights. Soldiers and a number of city employees helped to put up the tents which are 16x16 feet, and lay the board flooring. The tents are boarded up three feet from the ground.

Most of the inhabitants of Tentville have stored their furniture in the prospect of better days and are sleeping on cots furnished by a local hospital. The "town" is laid out in eight streets with one main avenue bisecting them.

BRITISH MERCHANTS BOYCOTT GERMANS

LONDON, April 28. I was then advised that Eaton had not shown up so I went to my dressing room and got into my street clothes as it was not any too tropical sitting around in a bathing suit.

Also the match-maker promised me the main event. Still I was willing to go on in the semi-final. I was disappointed by the non-appearance of Eaton at the time he agreed to appear. His train must have been a slow one. No doubt—or perhaps—he got sidetracked attempting a flying switch. Why couldn't he have wired in that he was unable to be on time? Judging from his actions he must have taken a great interest in his part. As for my part I came in two weeks ahead of time so took no chances on a slow train. VIENNA BOARDING GOLD AND SILVER

VIENNA, April 26. (By Mail).—There is hardly a silver or gold coin to be had in Vienna, owing to hoarding.

In an effort to bring them back into circulation the government is paying 23 paper crowns for each silver crown and 35 in paper for each one of gold.

An illustration of the barter basis on which Austria now finds itself as far as internal trade is concerned, was given at a meeting this week of the representatives of the Peasants' associations together with agrarian members of the assembly. When approached for not allowing food to come to Vienna, they offered to collect the surplus food supplies in the hands of the peasants through their own agencies and deliver it to the central government in exchange for agricultural implements and such articles as they stand in need of. They refused to consider payment in Austrian money.
