EVICTED SCORES

NEWARK, N. J., May 26 .- One hundred and ten families, evicted by iandlords, are comfortably housed in Vallaburgh Park today under tents loaned to the city of Newark by the war department. It is a real Tentville whose denigens, although temporarily homeless, are happy as could be expected in a community forced to live outdoors. It is expected that, before the end of summer. 300 families will have joined the littie colony.

Captain Thomas W. Reilly, a machinegus man with a fine overseas record, laid out the place and gave each arrival a first come, first served choice of their canvass habitation. One of them was a young widow with four children. She received an order to vacate her apartment after falling to defeat her landlord in a lawsuit.

The city appropriated \$25,000 for the operation of the camp and Governor Edwards denated a big tent which, in the center, serves as a community kitchen. Army food from the municipal sales stations helps further to keep down the cost of living. The new settlement is provided with many conveniencers including a sewerage system, running water, a laundry tent equipped with tubs and toilets
