WASHINGTON, May 27.—Next year's naval budget was fixed at about \$436,000,000 under a complete agreement on the naval appropriations bill reached today by the senate and house. The navy aviation budget is about \$20,000,000.

NEWARK, May 27.—Ten leaders of the outlaw railroad strike in New Jersey were indicted by the federal grand jury today under the Lever act. They are charged with conspiracy to obstruct interstate commerce.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—President Wilson's message vetoing the Republican peace resolution will be sent to congress today.

LONDON, May 27.—According to the soviet official statement for Wednesday, received from Moscow today, the town of Borisov on the Beresina, has been captured by the Bolsheviks in the campaign against the Poles.

PARIS, May 27.—Armenians have accepted an invitation from the Bolsheviks to send delegates to Moscow, according to information received at the French foreign office.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—President Wilson's proposal for an American mandate over Armenia was disapproved today by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Only four Democrats opposed action on the President's request. The vote was 11 to 4.

MCCARTHY, Alaska, April 6. (By Mail.)—To be snow bound in a blizzard and blinding fog on the Rohen glacier southeast of Mt. McKinley, for 49 hours, was the recent experience of Joe McLellan and George Walker, of McCarthy. Travel was impossible and the two men dug a hole in the snow where they remained until the storm lifted. The storm was the worst he has known in years, according to McCarthy, who is an Alaska "old timer."

### HEAD OF FILIPINO UNION INDICTED

HONOLULU, T. H., May 14. (By Mail.)—Pablo Manlapit, president of the Filipino union and prominent in sugar plantation strike circles, has been indicted by the territorial grand jury on a charge of embezzlement.

Manlapit is accused of having accepted \$56.40 from two countrymen to buy steamship tickets for them and converting the money to his own use. He was released on \$1,000 bonds.

Manlapit issued the order for the Filipinos to strike on the sugar plantations January 19 last, which was followed in a few days by the Japanese federation of labor order, calling out the Japanese. Later he changed sides and urged the Filipinos to return to work after attacking the Japanese for alleged failure to render the Filipinos aid.

Subsequently, he announced he had been misled and that the strike should be continued. Planters say that despite, or because of Manlapit's numerous orders to his countrymen, nearly all of them are at work. Recently, however, he was quoted as saying the Filipinos were considering a general walkout in all the islands.
