**OPPOSE KEATS MEMORIAL**  
LONDON, May 1. (By Mail.)—Some opposition is developing against a proposal to raise a fund of \$50,000 with which to buy, restore and maintain the house in Hampstead in which the poet Keats lived while he was writing some of his greatest work. The dissenting element contends the money might be better spent in aid of poets who have won world-wide fame, but who are now living in deep poverty.

### CHINESE CAN BE ISLAND CITIZENS

HONOLULU, T. H., May 6. (By Mail.)—Chinese merchants of Honolulu are conducting a strict boycott of Japanese goods and dealers, according to W. C. Gee, prominent Chinese merchant of the city and son of Gen Kin Fook, president of the Honolulu Chinese Merchants' association.

The proportion of Chinese stores in China, which abstain from handling all things Japanese is nine out of ten, according to Gee, who added that the proportion is not quite so high in Honolulu but that it is growing daily.

Gee stated that Chinese firms in China which do buy and handle Japanese goods in turn are boycotted and that similar procedure is being directed against such Chinese firms in Honolulu.

He predicted that in the near future there would be no Japanese goods handled by Chinese merchants.

Whether the Japanese were retaliating in kind, Gee was not prepared to say, but Youchi Furuya, acting consul-general of Japan, said that so far as he knew the relations between Japanese and Chinese merchants in Honolulu were cordial.

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 28.—A catalogue of the Oregon Agricultural college for the year 1887 was recently unearthed here, and the first thing to stare the finder in the face was a notice reading:

### GIANT NUGGET

LONDON, April 26. (By Mail.)—A lump of pure gold weighing just over 12 pounds, one of the largest nuggets ever found, has been discovered in the Kilo State Mines in the northeastern district of the Belgian Congo, according to the African World. It is now in the possession of the London Branch of the Banque du Congo Belge and will be sold on behalf of the Belgian government.
