Ginger Greenwood, well known as the second baseman of the famous team of 1916, is back on the job. Ginger will play second tomorrow.

Klamath has two good pitchers in Lovin and Hilton, both army pitchers. Lovin pitched for the 12th infantry and Hilton the camp team at Fort Stevens, Oregon. Jimmy Clark will be behind the bat, Bell on first base, Greenwood on second, Montgomery short, Kelly third and Tex Farrell, Dr. Noel and Bressler in the outfield.

The game will be at the Modoc Ball Park, near the bath house and will start promptly at 2:30.
