MEMORIAL DAY PLANS WORKING OUT SMOOTHLY

Capt. O. C. Applegate states that not much change in the Decoration day program can be announced today. All who are to take part in the military march to the cemetery in the forenoon should be on hand so that the march can begin promptly at 9:30.

The afternoon division consisting of the Ladies' Relief corps, war veterans, school brigade, Boy Scouts and all others who wish to participate should be on hand promptly so that the march to the bridge can start not later than 3 p. m. They should be at the starting point as soon as 2:30 p. m. The school children and all others who can should bring flowers and flags.

At the bridge over Link river the relief corps will perform the ritual ceremony in honor of naval heroes and on returning to the grove will perform the memorial ceremony in honor of the heroes of the Civil war, after which the numbers arranged for the afternoon program in the grove will proceed.
