CALIFORNIA NEWS

BROWN'S VALLEY, May 31.—Mrs. Elizabeth Eymard died at her home here Friday at the age of 69 years. She was a native of Germany. Besides a husband, Benjamin Eymard, she is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Joseph Laughlin of Hammon-ton; a brother, Jacob Gard and two sisters, Mrs. Witt of Live Oak, and Mrs. Mary Kupser.

GRASS VALLEY, May 31.—Jabez A. Jenkins found five 20-dollar gold pieces in a small can in a cellar which he was enlarging a day or two ago. He was about to throw the can away when he heard a rattle inside and upon investigating found the rusty gold coins that had been there for perhaps more than forty years and forgotten.

McCLOUD, May 31.—D. S. Painter, Assistant General Manager of the McCloud River Lumber company was host at a banquet served at the McCloud Hotel to about twenty men, celebrating the occasion of his twentieth year in the service of the McCloud company. All of his guests had also seen twenty or more years' service here. A number of old photographs, relics and reminiscences of the early days of McCloud furnished the diversion for the evening.

LAKEPORT, May 31.—Taking testimony in the second trial of Shafter Mathews, former clerk of Lake county, charged with embezzling county funds, has commenced.

NAPA, May 31.—James Martin Perry, who came to Napa in 1879, died at a local hospital here Friday.

GREENVILLE, May 31.—A forest fire broke out Wednesday near Stone & Webster Camp No. 4 in Butt Valley.

GRASS VALLEY, May 31.—Fred Thomas, a miner employed in the Pennsylvania Mine, one of the properties of the Empire Mining company, was killed in a cave-in in the mine during the noon hour Friday.

WOODLAND, Cal., May 31.—In conjunction with the observance of Memorial Day here, Fred Shaffer distributed some 900 returned service men certificates of gratitude issued by the Yolo county board of supervisors and credentials issued by the state and signed by Governor W. D. Stephens and Adjutant General J. D. Borree.

GRASS VALLEY, May 31.—Fred Thomas, an employe of the Pennsylvania shaft of the Empire mines, was killed while at work by a heavy piece of rock falling from the hanging wall and striking him on the back, crushing his spine. He was killed almost instantly.

OROVILLE, May 31.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the plant of the Western Ice and Fruit Cooling company in this city last night, causing a loss estimated at \$50,000. At the time the blaze was discovered there was no one at the plant.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—Great Western Power company of California was today authorized by the railroad commission to issue \$1,500,000 of its 7 per cent preferred stock to secure funds to enable it to complete what is known as the Caribou hydroelectric plant on the Feather River. It was originally estimated by power company engineers that the Caribou development would cost \$4,321,430. It is now estimated that the work will cost \$6,246,100, an increase of \$1,924,670.

RED BLUFF, May 31.—An army airplane carrying repair parts to a machine in the Sierra Nevada mountains 100 miles east of here, crashed to the ground today beside the disabled airplane and was wrecked, according to information by wireless to the forest patrol station here. Master Electrician J. Robins, the pilot, was unhurt.

TUBA CITY, May 31.—Claiming that the city is law abiding and the inhabitants so peaceable he has been able to make but one arrest during the two months he has served as nightwatchman, Lee McCune has tendered his resignation to the board of trustees.

MARYSVILLE, May 31.—The home of F. E. Smith, 316 B street, was robbed last night and wearing apparel and jewelry belonging to the Smith and Edward Bonham families stolen. The loss is estimated at about \$150.
