A Busy Lawmaker

Representative Campbell, of Kansas, occupies the important position of chairman of the Committee on Rules and is a busy man, as his committee is in session almost daily. He is the author of the bill just reported out by the House Committee on Labor creating a Woman's Bureau in the Department of Labor. This is a measure to formulate standards and policies which shall promote the welfare of wage-earning women, improve their working conditions, increase their efficiency and advance their opportunities for profitable employment. It will affect about 20,000,000 women employed in the industrial life of the country.

Mr. Campbell made the opening speech in support of the resolution to declare the war at an end.
