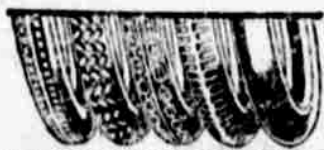

CEDAR SHINGLES USE DWINDLES

PORTLAND, June 3.—"Despite the fact that red cedar shingles are the oldest and most widely used roofing material in America today, their per capita consumption is steadily decreasing," says J. S. Williams, secretary-manager of the Shingle Branch, West Coast Lumbermen's Association, in a statement to the members of that association.

The reasons attributed by Mr. Williams for the decreased shingle consumption are inadequate advertising, instability of prices of both shingles and cedar logs and lack of intensive selling methods.

"Prior to the entrance of competing materials into the roofing field, shingle consumption was necessarily large and made possible the marketing of shingles with but little sales effort," declares Mr. Williams.

"Taking full advantage of the situation, the manufacturers of substitute roofing materials by sheer

magnitude of their advertising campaigns, extensive and intensive sales efforts, and cultivation of public good-will, have gained a very considerable market at the expense of the red shingle manufacturers."

"While the shingle manufacturers of the Northwest are beginning to realize the seriousness of the situation, they must co-operatively adopt more intensive and more modern merchandising methods to hold their ground."

"They must reach a better understanding with the loggers: the log market must be stabilized, so the mills will not be at the mercy of fluctuating prices in their supply of raw material. This will make it possible for the manufacturers to eliminate the frequent and erratic fluctuation in shingle prices. Many dealers have been antagonistic to the sale of shingles principally because of the frequent advance and decline in price, which have made competitive conditions quite difficult."

"The shingle manufacturers are urged to give greater support to the shingle association's national advertising campaign, now running in the principal magazines. This advertising is making red cedar shingles the most popular siding material in the

East and Midwest and is aiding greatly in sustaining the demand for shingles."

PERU HAS TROUBLE WITH JAPANESE

BUENOS AIRES, May 1. (By Mail).—Peru, like the United States and Canada, has its "Asiatic problem." Advice from Lima tell of the distribution of circulars among the workers of that city protesting against "the monopolization by the Asiatic and Japanese element of our small industries" and the holding of a protest meeting. The advice state that the policy "very discreetly dissuaded" the protestants from holding a street demonstration.

There has been a large increase reported in the Japanese immigration to Peru recently.

CO-OPERATIVE STORE SYSTEM IN AUSTRIA

VIENNA, May 14. (By Mail).—The Nether-Austria Workman's Co-operative stores has been organized here with a membership of 400,000. It will extend its activities not only to the usual commodities of such concerns but establish bakeries, butcheries and dairy stations.
