PORTLAND, June 3 .- "Despite the fact that red cedar shingles are the oldest and most widely used roofing material in America today. their per capita consumption is steadily decreasing," says J. S. Williams, secretary-manager of the Shingle Branch, West Coast Lumbermen's Association, in a statement to the members of that association.

The reasons attributed by Mr. Williams for the decreased shingle consumption are inadequate advertising, instability of prices of both shingles and cedar logs and lack of intensive selling methods.

"Prior to the entrance of competing materials into the roofing field, shingle consumption was necessarily large and made possible the marketing of shingles with but little sales
