### LAST RITES FOR THE HON. GEO. T. BALDWIN

Many friends gathered yesterday afternoon to pay a last tribute of respect to the memory of, and to follow to the last resting place all that remained mortal of the late Hon. George T. Baldwin.

Services were held at 2:30 o'clock at the Presbyterian church, the Rev. E. P. Lawrence delivering a short but impressive eulogy.

### DEVELOPING PLANT ENLARGED AT STAR

A modern and elaborate plant for developing and printing films has been installed by the Star Drug company. Three tanks, capable of taking care of forty rolls of film at once is one of the time saving devices. The new electric drier, equal to any in the largest city, is the biggest feature of the film department. The prints revolve around a large electrically heated drum which dries and smooths them at one operation. This requires only five minutes, and by the old method took five or six hours.

Films arriving at the store at 5 o'clock on one day can be received at the same hour on the next. Prints are made entirely on Velox paper. A photographer of twelve years experience has full charge of this department, so that the public is insured against amateurs.

## INTERIOR DEPT DENIES INTENT TO LEASE LANDS

The following denial by Secretary of the Interior Colby on any plan on the part of the government to lease 110,000 acres of Klamath reservation land is from the Oregonian's news bureau at Washington, and was printed as a special dispatch in the Oregonian:

In answer to a protest of the American Legion post at Klamath Falls, Ore., Secretary John Barton Payne of the interior department, denied that the government had contemplated leasing 20,000 acres of land on the Klamath reservation and 90,000 acres of land in Big Marsh to the California-Oregon Power company. Secretary Payne in his letter, which was sent to Senator Chamberlain, disclosed, however, that a lease on 8620 acres had been made to the power company by former Secretary Lane.

He said: "On February 26, 1920, Secretary Lane entered into an agreement with the aforesaid company, whereby that company was given a lease on 8620 acres of land bordering upper Klamath lake on the east and north within the Klamath Indian reservation, subject to the consent of the tribal council as to tribal land and subject to the consent of the allottees as to the allotted land, and it was agreed that the department, through its proper representatives, would use its endeavors to procure the consent of the tribal council. This lease was entered into after the fullest consideration and appears to be for the benefit of the Indians and in no wise opposed to the proposed soldier settlement movement. The land will be reclaimed under the terms of the lease and returned to the Indians at the expiration of the lease-hold periods of five and ten years in a very much improved condition over what it is today.

"With respect to the lease of 90,000 acres of land on the Big Marsh, I may say that I understand that the commissioner of Indian affairs has had an inquiry concerning this mat-

ter, but that no formal application for a lease of the land is pending at the present time."

JEWES COME TO CANADA
