LYCEUM LEADER IS CALLED BY DEATH

E. G. Beauchamp, instructor in military training at the county high school was called to Millford, Iowa, a few days ago by a message announcing the illness of his father, Leo J. Beauchamp. Before he arrived there, however, his father was dead and relatives had started with the body for the family home at Hamilton, Iowa, according to word received by friends here.

The elder Mr. Beauchamp was the honorary life president of the International Lyceum association and was in Millford filling one of the engagements when called by death.

He was one of the two oldest men on the Chautauqua platform in America. About two months ago the Rotary and Commercial clubs of Hamilton joined in a banquet honoring Mr. Beauchamp on the occasion of his having delivered his 100,000th lecture, and presented him with a valuable watch among other tokens of esteem.

WAR DECLARED ON SEA LION HERDS

PRINCE ALBERT, B. C., June 10.—Thousands of sea lions on the British Columbia coast which destroy annually vast quantities of cod, salmon, halibut and other food fish, may be slaughtered and their hides placed on the market. This proposal was made by Premier John Oliver, and is being considered by fishermen and others. The supply is almost exhausted, it is said, and tanning of the hides would assist materially in reducing the reported world leather shortage.

One Prince Rupert pioneer declared recently that with three companies he had killed 700 sea lions on the Queen Charlotte Islands, in two days. The hunter must be a crack shot, for it is said there is but one vulnerable spot just behind the ears, and a wounded lion will flop into the water and sink instantly.

The sea lions, it is said, weigh from 2,000 to 2,500 pounds. The hides are nearly an inch in thickness and make a tough and durable rough leather such as is used in workmen's gloves, and saddles.

ARMY STUDY COURSE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—Business, music and agriculture are the main subjects which will be taught in the army training school, recently established at Camp Grant near Rockford, Ill., according to information received from the Western Army Department headquarters by the Army Recruiting News Service, 560 Market street, San Francisco.

Among the other subjects taught at this school are electricity, building and construction, textile manufacture, metal and its allied lines, highway construction and topography and machine shop supervision.

WILL HANDLE MORE PICTURES

The average person has little idea of the large number of kodak pictures that are taken every day by the army of camera owners. A visit to the kodak department of Underwood's pharmacy is most interesting. Two dark rooms have been equipped. In the first, or development room, the films are run through a series of tanks filled with carefully prepared solutions that bring out the details of the picture and develop to proper density. There are seven tanks, making it possible to develop five hundred rolls of film daily, should the capacity be taxed.

In the other dark room the printing is done. Nothing but the best grade of Velox paper is used, and by means of an automatic electric printer the finest work is always assured. After the print is fixed it is washed in a device operated by water power that completely removes all chemicals from the paper, thus insuring that the prints will never fade or turn yellow. From the washer the pictures are transferred to a Majestic drier, which is heated by a gas flame and operated by an electric motor. Six hundred prints can be dried and given the proper finish in this machine every hour.

An experienced operator is in charge, and with her assistants, is able to turn out hundreds of prints daily.

MANILA TEACHERS WANT MORE PAY

MANILA, P. I., May 15. (By Mail.)—Nearly one hundred native teachers in the Manila public schools have resigned during one month and officials of the board of education say that others will present their resignations soon, on account of the low salaries.

The majority of the teachers in the city schools receive only \$25 to \$30 a month, and they say they are unable to live on that meager pay. Commercial houses have employed these teachers at more than double the salaries they received in the schools.

The board of education, with the approval of the Governor General, has offered to increase the salaries of the teachers by five dollars a month at the beginning of the next school term in June, but it is said this proposed increase has not deterred any of them from leaving.

MINERS SEEK PLAN FOR READJUSTMENT

DENVER, Colorado, June 10.—Readjustment of the mining industry to post-war conditions, encouragement of a return of self-confidence among mining men, discussion of the labor situation in all industries, consideration of national and state mining and employers' liability laws, are a few of the objects of a great national convention called by the American Mining Congress in this city November 15-19 next.

Consideration of a taxation program affecting the mining industries of the Nation will be the subject under discussion in a National Wasting Industries Tax Conference. All national and state industrial bodies will be invited to participate in a three day conference on Industrial Relations and producers, financiers and manufacturers will be called together to discuss the problems of the gold and silver miners.

Stabilization of industry and lowering of living costs through the national adoption of a truce between labor and capital to allow speeding up of production will be discussed by employers, labor leaders and government officials.
