INTERNAL REVENUE TAXES ARE NOW DUE

PORTLAND, June 11.—June is a busy month for the Internal Revenue Bureau as during that month all special taxes for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, are due and payable.

Collector of Internal Revenue, Milton A. Miller, has mailed out to all special taxpayers forms upon which return for payment of tax must be made. These special taxpayers include proprietors of theatres, for hire automobiles, pleasure boats, pool and billiard tables, bowling alleys, shooting galleries, retail dealers in oleomargarine, brokers, pawn brokers, etc.

Other classes of taxpayers affected are druggists, physicians, dentists and other practitioners, who must complete their re-registration under the Harrison Act not later than July first, after which date they will be delinquent.

On or before June 15th the second installment of income tax will be due and payable, and notices for this tax were sent out some weeks ago. Persons who fail to pay the quarterly installment due on June 15th will be required, within ten days after notice and demand, to pay the entire outstanding balance on their income tax, as failure to pay one installment when due makes due and payable all the remaining installments which would ordinarily be due on September 15th and December 15th.

Collector Miller would greatly appreciate the co-operation of taxpayers in making their returns and payments as early in June as possible.

TEN CENT BEER IS DOOMED, MANILA

MANILA, P. I., May 15. (By Mail.)—The day of the ten cent beer is numbered, according to saloon keepers, on account of the increased internal revenue tax placed upon the beverage by a bill which was passed by the recent extra session of the Philippine legislature.

The management of one large brewery gave notice that the wholesale price of beer would be increased at once, and retailers say when their present stocks are exhausted, they must either raise the price above twenty centavos a glass (ten cents) or cut down the size of the glasses.
