HAGUE COURT IS ORGANIZED

THE HAGUE, May 15. (By Mail).—A draft for the permanent Court of International Justice of the League of Nations, as it has been offered to the Secretariate of the league in the name of Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Switzerland and Holland, has been made public by the Dutch government. It is the result of the conferences held in the Peace Palace at the Hague in February.

According to the plan the court would consist of 15 judges and six substitutes, who must all be recognized authorities on international justice. Its members would be chosen by the assembly of the league; the judges to be appointed for nine years, the substitutes for six.

The members would be elected without regard of their nationality but no more than two judges of the same country could hold office in the court. They would be re-eligible but they would have to resign when 66 years old. They would then have a right to a pension, which, like their salary would be fixed and paid by the League.

The duties of the court would be to adjudicate differences between nations and it would be competent to act on all cases in which its decision is asked.

The permanent Court of International Justice is provided for in Article XIV of the covenant of the League of Nations. The Council of the League of Nations at a session in London in February announced that a committee of 12 distinguished international jurists including Elihu Root of the United States had been invited to prepare plans for the construction of the Court. Mr. Root accepted the invitation as did Lord Phillimore of England, Baron Descamps of Belgium, Dr. Loder of Holland and M. Vesnotch of Jugoslavia. No plans as formulated by the committee for the organization of the Court have yet been announced.

NINTH CHICAGO DRAWBRIDGE IS IN

CHICAGO, June 12.—Ten thousand tons of steel, Chicago's new boulevard link bridge, settled into place recently with a whirring of gears, and for the ninth time in 117 years north and southern Chicago were connected by a direct lake front route.

The new bridge, a double deck bascule, or "jack knife" type, is a triumph of engineering skill. When the draw is open for passing ships the two immense "leaves" tower 150 feet into the air. A broad boulevard viaduct leads to the upper level, reserved for pleasure vehicles only, while trucks and drays rumble over the lower passageway. The bridge cost \$16,000,000 and more than 20 years were spent in its planning and construction.

IDLE SAWMILL AGAIN BROUGHT INTO ACTIVITY

PORTLAND, June 12.—A notorious white elephant here in the shape of the Monarch Lumber Mill has been harnessed and put to work. This huge mill, which is capable of producing 31,250 feet of lumber an hour, operated only a short time after it was finished, was entangled in litigation and has lain idle ever since. It has now been taken over by Lester W. Davis, an enterprising lumberman, is furnishing employment for 175 men, and is producing a lot of good lumber at a good profit.
